





Corps Cmdr. Jonathan Whittles said "the hardest thing about Freshman Orientation Week is that you don't run your own life anymore."


They must learn how to be led before they can learn how to lead, he said. Freshman Jason Viel of Plano said that training was "intense. It was a lot of work, but it will be worth it."
