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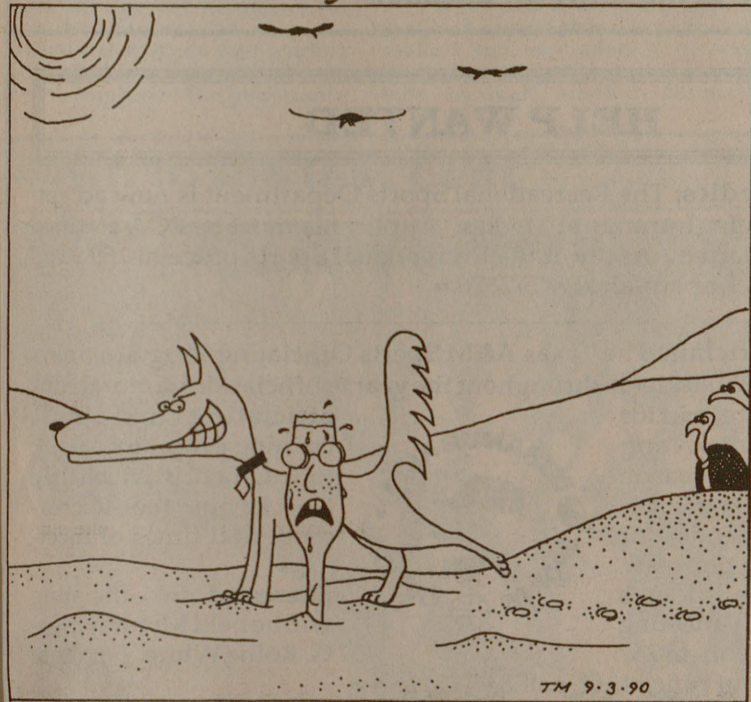

Questionable police action prompts report



JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — An official commission issued a stinging report Saturday saying police fired without reason on a protest march, killing five blacks and wounding 156. The report recommended a criminal investigation. The report into police conduct at the Sebokeng township March 26 was one of the harshest criticisms of police conduct ever made by an official inquiry. The attorney general should investigate policemen who fired bullets for possible criminal action, said the report, written by Justice R.J. Goldstone. Police "displayed an attitude of unconcern for the lethal nature of their ammunition ... This is an attitude which no police force should tolerate," the report said. It was released at a time when police are under attack from the African National Congress, church groups and others for alleged bias and improper conduct in black factional fighting around Johannesburg.

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"It (the proactive policy) is the most effective thing for Texas A&M University," Riley said. In its report, the committee cited newly implemented policies at other universities that punished those who discriminated against others. The committee stated in its report, "...it was felt that a policy similar to the ones adopted at other universities would act as a lightning rod for constitutional attack and detract from the true purpose of fostering a more tolerant environment at Texas A&M University." It also stated the program would encourage an educational environment in which discrimination will be less likely to occur because faculty, staff and students will have developed an appreciation of A&M's diverse campus. Carl Carey, a committee member and representative from the Black Awareness Committee, said he thought the minority students at A&M would be pleased with the final report. "I would assume that it (the report) would make minority students on campus more comfortable to know that the University is behind

them as far as denouncing discrimination, harassment and racism," he said. Georgette Lopez-Aguado, a member of the committee and a representative of the Committee for the Awareness of Mexican American Culture, said she would like to see a mandatory culture-awareness class added to the core curriculum. "We're a society that needs immediate gratification," she said. "A multicultural course would probably not be immediately gratifying for many. But once students go out to the real world, they'll realize that multiculturalism is it (a part of today's society)."
