Although Rozier said the Los An-eles Rams and Cleveland had expressed interest in signing him, he preferred to to play for the Falcons, now run by former Houston coach Nebraska Jerry Glanville.

"I'd like to go down with Jerry since I know the offense and I know Jerry," Rozier said before leaving. "It won't take too long to adjust to the offense. I can fit in and play this week if necessary

Rozier led the Oilers in rushing four straight years and made the Pro Bowl in 1987 and 1988: But he was the odd man out in the

Oilers' new run-and-shoot offense that employs one running back. He gained a career-low 301 yards

last season after missing training camp as a contract holdout and un-

dergoing knee surgery. Oilers general manager Mike Ho-lovak said he released Rozier when he couldn't make a trade for the former Heisman Trophy winner from bye to them.'

Rozier said he understood. "It wasn't any bad feelings, it's business," Rozier said. "You've got to be prepared to go anywhere in the NFL. That's life. It doesn't bother me


