

Senators threaten Mosbacher election

AUSTIN (AP) — Three Democratic state senators blasted GOP lieutenant governor candidate Rob Mosbacher and hinted Thursday that the Senate might strip the lieutenant governor of power if Mosbacher's elected.

"Who knows, but you know that we can take the gavel away," Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos of Austin, said referring to the lieutenant governor's position as Senate presiding officer.

Barrientos appeared at a news conference with Sens. Eddie Bernice Johnson of Dallas and John Montford of Lubbock, all Senate Finance Committee members.

They complained that Mosbacher, Texas welfare board chairman, has suggested no way to pay for the \$2.5 billion budget increase that the Department of Human Services has requested from the Legislature.

"If you're going to request that kind of new money, we want to know how to pay for it, because we're not going to shoulder all the blame," Montford, Finance Committee chairman, said.

Lawmakers face a \$3.7 billion budget deficit for the next two years "if we freeze everything in place," he said.

Mark Sanders, spokesman for Mosbacher, called the criticism "pure politics" from supporters of Democratic lieutenant governor candidate Bob Bullock.

"These people seem to be more interested in playing political games than taking care of the needy and the poor in this state," Sanders said.

The budget request was approved by the DHS board, not just Mosbacher, Sanders said. He said it's the Legislature's job to either pare down state agency budget requests or come up with needed revenue.

Sanders also said he hoped the Senate wouldn't "reject the voters' will" by taking away the lieutenant governor's power if Mosbacher is elected.

The lieutenant governor, with powers primarily conferred by Senate rules, is the Senate's presiding officer. The lieutenant governor has authority to appoint Senate committees and control the Senate agenda.

Restaurant Report

Student Korner at 1802 Welsh Ave. **Score - 99.** Points deducted for unclean floors. It was a regularly scheduled inspection.

Mazzio's Pizza at 1802 Texas Ave. **Score - 98.** Points were deducted for improper storage of clean equipment. The inspection was due to a complaint.

Domino's Pizza at 1504 Holleman Drive. **Score - 96.** Points were deducted for unprotected outer openings. It was a regularly scheduled inspection.

SCORED BETWEEN 94 AND 90:
ShIPLEY Donuts at 1716 Southwest Parkway. **Score - 92.** Points were deducted for presence of insects/rodents and inaccessible toilet and handwashing facilities (both major violations). It was a regularly scheduled inspection.

Kettle Restaurant at 2502 Texas Ave. **Score - 90.** Points were deducted for unclean food contact surfaces, unclean floors, inaccessible toilet and handwashing facilities (major violation), improper plumbing maintenance and failure to provide hand cleansers. It was a regularly scheduled inspection.

David Jefferson, a registered sanitarian at the department, said restaurants with scores of 95 or above generally have excellent operations and facilities. He said restaurants with scores in the 70s or low 80s usually have serious violations in the health report.

Scores can be misleading, Jefferson said, because restaurants can get the same score by having several minor violations or a few major violations. He said the minor violations can be corrected during the inspection. Point deductions or violations in the report range from one point (minor violations) to five points (major violations).

Jefferson said the department might close a restaurant if the score is below 60, the personnel have infectious diseases, the restaurant lacks adequate refrigeration, there is a sewage backup in the building or the restaurant has a complete lack of sanitation for the food equipment.

The department inspects each restaurant every six months. Jefferson said a follow-up inspection is sometimes required if a restaurant has a four- or five-point violation that cannot be corrected during the inspection, or if there are numerous small violations.

Inspectors at the department are registered sanitarians.

Soldiers face charge of murder

FORT HOOD (AP) — Three Fort Hood soldiers who were returning from Saudi Arabia over the weekend have been charged in the killing of a Bell County woman, authorities said.

A preliminary autopsy determined that the unidentified woman was murdered. Bell County sheriff investigator Bill Miller said. He said that how and when the woman was killed had not been determined.

Her decomposed body was found Sunday.

Pvt. 1st Class Everett Boswell, assigned to the 1st Cavalry Division at Fort Hood, was being held in a military jail there, a base spokesman said. Boswell already was in custody when military and county investigators found the woman's body in a wooded area near Stillhouse southeast of Killen.

Post spokeswoman Liz Croy said PFC Gregory Topping was charged Wednesday with accessory to murder after the fact.

They also are members of the Cavalry.

Boswell was charged with premeditated murder, Croy said. Authorities said Topping and Gaunt were called back from the Middle East to face charges.

Man gets 24 years for assault and hijack attempt

AUSTIN (AP) — A man who admitted trying to hijack an America West jet to Cuba was sentenced Thursday to more than 24 years in federal prison and ordered to pay \$89,490 in restitution.

Jose Manuel Gonzalez-Gonzalez was convicted of air piracy and assaulting a flight attendant in the Jan. 16 hijacking.

U.S. District Judge James Nowlin sentenced Gonzalez-Gonzalez to 24 years and five months in prison, followed by five years of reporting to a

parole officer.

Gonzalez-Gonzalez also was ordered to pay more than \$80,000 to America West and the remainder of the restitution to an insurance company, Kelly Loving, assistant U.S. attorney responsible for the case, said.
