"Engineer of the Century" Paul MacCready lems. A slide show will accompany his speech. will discuss creative and environmental options available to Texas A&M students and faculty members during his two-day visit to the Univer-

MacCready invented the Gossamer Condor, the first human-powered airplane. His company, Aerovironment Inc., now is designing several electrical automobiles for General Motors.

MacCready will give a presentation at 7 p.m.

Tuesday in 108 Harrington.

He was awarded the "Engineer of the Century" gold medal by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers in 1981 when he unveiled the

solar-powered aircraft — the Solar Challenger.

MacCready's trip to the University is sponsored by the A&M College of Architecture, College of Engineering and the Provost's Office for Research and Graduate Study.

During his visit, he also will speak to several architecture and engineering classes and will meet Tuesday with A&M faculty members.
