"People now agree about 600 Kuwaitis were killed when Iraq invaded Kuwait," Cockburn said. "Was it worth killing a 100,000 Iraqis to even up the

Hitchens said the alternative press is necessary because mainstream media simply report what the government says and offer no insight.




