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

When the first four rounds were finished Sunday and Darren hadn't been taken, I thought of former A&M linebacker Aaron Wallace.

Wallace, who now plays for the Los Angeles Raiders, was a player like Darren. The two always seemed to play their best

when it meant the most. Watching them play was the reason why I became a fan of A&M football.

Remember beating Houston and Andre Ware in 1989 at Kyle Field? Wallace and Lewis showed what big-time players can do in the national spotlight.

But Darren was more than just a great runner. He was a player who conducted himself with class — a rare quality in athletes today.

A quiet man from Dallas Carter, Darren entertained us for four years, giving everything he had, and last weekend he received little credit for it. If A&M had played better last year and had made a run at the national championship, Darren would probably have been a first or second round pick.


Rumor has it that Darren refused to run the 40-yard das for NFL scouts, making teams question his speed and attitude Can you blame him?

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
