green jerseys? I can name four, all playing for the Orlando Thunder.

The official "helmet cam" literally puts you into the game, grinding out yards from a first person perspective. David Letterman has nothing that can compare.

For real color commentary, though, nothing beats the built in microphones each player has in his helmet. This not only lets the television audience in on the plays in advance, but also allows for immediate analysis of the plays and calls by on-field personnel - live and uncensored.

Where else can a sports fan hear a coach scream at his players in English, German, and Italian?

For halftime entertainment fireworks light up the skies over the stadiums, but the real entertainment comes when the teams light up the endzones with wild celebration dances after touchdowns. The WLAF has no anti-celebration rule like the NFL, and the dances often resemble something choreographed by Paula Abdul. It may look silly, but the Europeans eat it up.

The NFL may well look to some of the other rule changes the WLAF has come up with. Pro football finally has a two point conversion, a gripe I've had with the NFL for years. The stupid "in the grasp" rule has been booted, along with the evil instant re-

play. On kickoffs the ball is live from the moment it is kicked until it goes out of bounds, and touchbacks are only brought out to the 10 yard line, encouraging more running.

All of this has been designed to improve the game, and generate fan interest. Apparently it is working.

The London Monarchs have an average attendance of 35,000 at Wembley Stadium. The Barcelona Dragons packed 45,000 into their Olympic Stadium two weeks ago, outdrawing every European soccer game that weekend. Those may not be Superbowl attendance figures, but it's better than the old USFL did in its last year.

The European teams have been so successful the ten team World League may not stay ten much longer. Moscow, Paris and Rome have made bids for teams in future expansion. Tokyo, Argentina and Australia both contacted Tex Schramm about expansion while he was still president of the league, and several U.S. cities have also expressed interest.

Like it or not, the WLAF is here to stay, and if the NFL isn't careful, these foreign teams could take the parent league down a notch or two. I'm not laughing anymore.

ing 13 hits, but could only manage five runs, stranding 16 base runners. The Ags were led by Huckntod's three hits and two runs batted in. Catcher Blake Pyle, left fielder Mike Hickey, and Colby each had two hits in the game.

Hickey was also involved in the big play of the game.

Hickey attempted to score on a Robinson sacrifice fly, only to be tagged out by TCU chatcher Kyle Caple in a hard collision at the plate. Caple and TCU pitcher Jared Schope exchanged words and shoves with Hickey, and both benches cleared. This was the second consecutive series for the Aggies that involved a bench clearing scuffle.

Johnson showed concern about the fight, but declined to point fingers.

"It was a close play," Johnson was blocking the plate," Caple said. "There was a collision at

the plate, then some pushing and shoving. A whole lot of our players, and whole lot of theirs joined in."

In Friday night's series opener, freshman left-hander Jeff Granger continued his domination of opposing batters. Granger (7-2) gave up two runs on a homerun by TCU catcher Mark Rudis, but held the Horned-Frogs to just six hits.

Granger recorded seven strikeouts in the Aggies' 9-2 opening victory raising his season total to 101, eight shy of the A&M season record held by Clint Thomas (109 in 1976).

The sweep of TCU in Fort Worth was the first for A&M since 1977, and improved A&M's record to 12-6 in SWC play, 40-17 overall.

The Horned Frogs dropped to 8-10 in conference play, 30-21 overall and are virtually eliminated from tournament play.

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
