Their best-of-5 NBA Western Conference playoff series began with San Antonio wearing down Golden State in Game 1. But it changed course when the Warriors relatively small lineup stopped the bigger Spurs in Game 2.

With the series tied 1-1 and moving to Oakland, the Spurs can't play the pivotal third game the way they did Game 2, coach

Larry Brown said.
"Some of the guys had great efforts, but I don't think as a team it was real good," Brown said. "Certainly not for a playoff game and for a team trying to

win an NBA championship.

"We've just got to play like this is the most important thing in our lives."

Spurs starting forward Sean Elliott, who suffered a broken nose in the second period Saturday, is expected to wear a pro-tective face guard and play

Wednesday. Elliott's absence in the second half hurt, Brown said. Chris Mullin, the player Elliott was guarding, scored 21 of his 27 points in the second half after Elliott left the game.

"Losing Sean took 15 points away from us, plus it kills you with flexibility because he was out and (David) Wingate couldn't play," Brown said.

Wingate, a reserve guard, received treatment for a pulled hamstring Sunday. He was expected to play in Game 3.
The Spurs-Warriors series will

resume Wednesday in Oakland.

As a former member of the squad, I can give some insighton the problems that led to this action by R.C. Slocum.

First, the kickoff scheme set up by the coaches promoted conservative style of play. Contrary to popular belief, the players are not "kamikazies" that run down the field in reckles

abandon. Each player has a responsibility to do a particular job.

Under Slocum's system, each player was responsible for an
"alley" an the field five yards wide. This can be contrasted by
the system under Jackie Sherill where four players had the responsibility of going to the ball carrier, and the rest of the play ers were "alley guys." The system under Sherill promoted as gressive play which the 12th man was famous for. This point can be illustrated by comparing the statistics between the last year Sherill coached and the first year Slocum coached. The average jumped from 14.7 yards per kick to 22.1 yards per kick and this was a team that returned most of the lettermen and starters from the previous year.

The second reason for the demise of the squad was the atttude of the coaches toward non-scholarship players. We were treated like "step-children" compared to the other players. The coaches talked down to us like we were scared, stupid people that lacked athletic ability. In reality we were smart, educated college students who had played many years of high school football. Many of the players had played for smaller colleges We were never given the confidence we needed to perform a the level of competition necessary to be successful.

I enjoyed playing football for Texas A&M, but was disappointed when I was watching the Texas game and Holiday Bowl from the stands instead of the playing field. It saddens me to see another great tradition at Texas A&M fade away.


