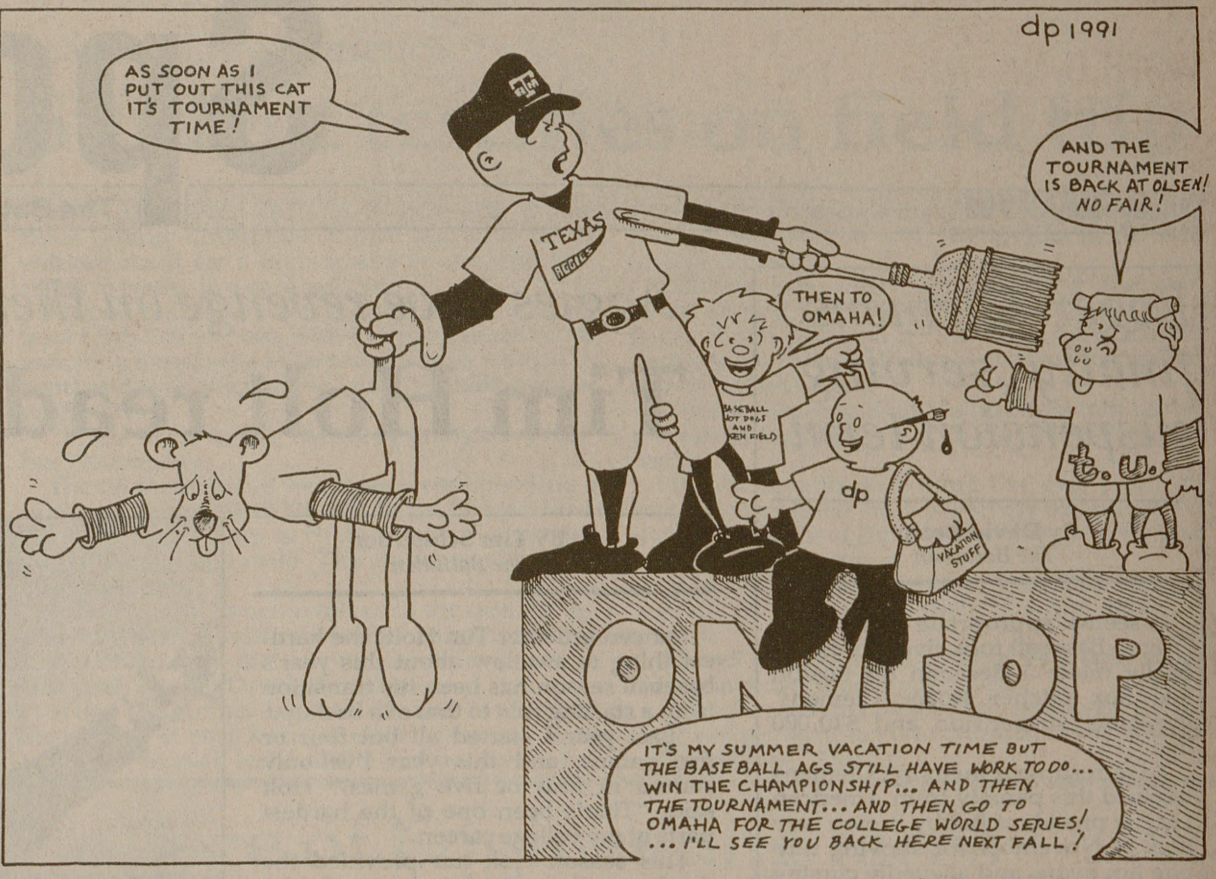

 beginning of the season and not dragged on for so long. Roger Clemens' next scheduled start is tonight against the Chicago White Sox, with his scoreless streak still intact. But maybe not for long. What will essentially be a 10 day rest before tonight's start, Clemens may lose just enough focus or control to end his scoreless streak.
 With the way the Rocket was pitching, Orel Hershiser's 1988 record-setting scoreless streak of 59+ innings was definitely in jeopardy. The only thing that could have derailed the Rocket was a long overdue suspension. And that's what happened.
 By the way, the umpiring crew for this weekend's series between the Red Sox and White Sox will be Terry Cooney's.

Spurs facing elimination
 OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—The San Antonio Spurs, second-seeded in the Western Conference playoffs, are out of excuses against the seventh-seeded Golden State Warriors.
 "We've got to play it like it's the last game because if we don't win, it will be," the Spurs' Willie Anderson said.
 Finding themselves on the brink of elimination may even help the Midwest Division champions regain control of the best-of-5 series, Spurs center David Robinson said.
 "Now it's a do-or-die situation, and we tend to respond real well in those situations," he said.
 If necessary, a fifth game would be played Sunday at San Antonio.
 Spurs coach Larry Brown said his team played out of character in its 109-106 loss Wednesday night, relying too much on outside shooting rather than working the ball inside where they could use their size advantage against the Warriors' four-guard lineup.
 "We are not a perimeter shooting team; I've said that all along," Brown said.
 Considering the numbers — the Warriors outshot the Spurs from the field, 57 percent to 45 percent and had a 36-35 rebounding advantage — Golden State is hoping San Antonio keeps going for jumpers rather than layups.
 "If he (Robinson) wants to post up and then turn around and shoot a jumper, that's fine. That's what I'm giving him," said Warriors forward Tom Tolbert, who is five inches shorter than the 7-foot-1 Robinson.
 Robinson led San Antonio with 27 points, but his point production was matched by the Warriors' Mitch Richmond, who had 11 in the fourth quarter.

Ryanmania runs wild
 ARLINGTON (AP)—Wednesday night Nolan Ryan took 33,439 fans into seventh heaven with his record seventh no-hitter.
 It was like paradise even for those who didn't make the incredible journey. Hundreds of fans flooded the Texas Rangers ticket office switchboard Thursday, looking for souvenirs of Ryan's latest achievement.
 Ticket manager John Schreiber said that by noon he had received 350 calls from collectors across the country asking if they could buy unused tickets to Wednesday night's historic 3-0 Rangers victory over the Toronto Blue Jays.
 "But we got all the tickets, about 2,000 of them, locked in a vault," Schreiber said. "We're not selling the tickets because we need to hang onto them for auditing purposes."
 In Houston, where Ryan pitched nine seasons before the Astros allowed him to become a free agent and sign with Texas after the 1988 season, KRPC-TV sportsman Craig Roberts broke into the 10 p.m. newscast to announce Ryan's feat.
 "He just keeps doing it to make John McMullen mad," Roberts said, referring to the majority shareholder of the Houston Sports Association, which owns the Astros.
