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





option" billing plan, but parent Tele-Communications Inc. went ahead with its debut date. Florida Attorney General Bob Butterworth won the court order Saturday after charging Storer

would violate Florida's unfair trade law by forcing customers to cancel the channel after a free month to avoid an otherwise automatic monthly fee. Attorneys general in Texas,

Iowa and Washington have followed up with similar suits, and Butterworth's deputy Peter Antonacci said Florida is discussing the case with officials in other states.

The companies were active on two legal fronts Monday, with Miami-based Storer submitting a notice of appeal in West Palm Beach and Denver-based TCI suing the state in Tallahassee to

stop it from intervening.
Attorney Terry Bienstock, representing both TCI and the subsidiary, claimed the state's enforcement violated Storer's First Amendment protections against prior restraint.

Antonacci countered, "Everybody's permitted to broadcast." He said the state attacked only the billing method and expressly said broadcast was not impeded.

Raising the First Amendment issue was "an argument of convenience," Antonacci said. "It's

a gouging question."
"We plan to make it our task

to see to it that negative options are not permitted to exist in Florida, at least in the form that they have done it in. I think the Bookof-the-Month Club is a fine way to conduct a commercial enterprise," he said. "You agree to a negative procedure in advance.

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
