#### Mobley supports tuition increase, Gage says

ing 25 percent.

increasing out-of-state tuition waiver on academic scholarships from \$200 to \$1,000 and

limit from 5 percent to 2 percent.
Gage said he and A&M President William Mobley support a tuition increase, but not if the state keeps 75 percent of the net increase.

That recommendation would nullify a tuition increase since Gage's office calculated that A&M would lose \$1.5 million per

year from the changes.

Even if the Legislature does not support Sharp's tuition proposals, Gage said a tuition increase is likely.

"The plan recommends the increase in Fall 1992, but I imagine it will go into effect in Spring 1992," he said.

Another area of prime interest is the TPR's interest factors, which will result in the loss of earned interest on local funds. Local funds are generated from room and board fees, Business Services, Food Services, the airport and others.

Local funds are used for items not funded by state revenue, such as maintenance, repairs, equipment, utilities upgrade, academic scholarships and faculty development leaves.

If that portion of the comptrol-ler's plan is enacted, A&M will lose \$23.9 million in the next biennium and will be forced to hike fees for room and board, parking, snacks and other cam-

pus services.
The TPR also recommends a 50 percent reduction in funding for research and research centers. Gage said programs like the Cyclotron and Institute for Biosciences and Technology will suf-fer greatly since the University

uses state research monies to apply for federal and other external

funding.

Another of the comptroller's

Another of the comptroller's recommendations is to reduce the state's matching contributions to the Optional Retirement Program (ORP).

Under the plan, the state would reduce its contribution from 8.5 percent to 5.99 percent, leaving A&M to make up the difference with its local funds.

All these budget problems

come at a time when Texas is ranked near the bottom in the nation in all important higher education categories. The following figures from 1990 show that higher education is not the highest priority in the state:

☐ Texas ranked 44th out of 46 states reporting for resident undergraduate tuition and 23rd for non-residents. Texas' average was \$973 per year compared to the national average of \$1,603;

☐ Texas ranked last in state appropriations per student at \$3,341 compared to the national average of \$4,388;

☐ Texas ranked last in state appropriations plus tuition and fees with \$4,314. The national average was \$5,991;
☐ Texas appropriated \$3,500 per student in 1985. The state

now appropriates only \$2,800 per student.

Though Gage presented a doomsday set of figures for A&M, he hopes that legislators can be convinced in the coming weeks not to enact Sharp's recommendations.

"Our expectation level is that avoing A&M to make up the diference with its local funds.

All these budget problems "Our expectation level is that it won't be as bad as a \$53 million loss," he said. "We're hoping to enlighten some people."


