"Barrientos said states like California and Illinois have the legislation and some great schools," McHargue said. "Then he listed states without student regent legislation like Idaho and Mississippi and said, 'Look at the company Texas is in.' "

McHargue questioned the feasability of student regents taking office by the Fall 1991 semester. He said appointments for Spring 1992 are much more likely.

He said Sen. Turner supports student representation at state universities but will wait to see how the provision works before considering adding voting priv-

"I've seen student regent bills go down in flames for years," he said. "Voting was often the stumbling block for many legis-

"Many were won over by the non-voting provision, though," he added. "What we did today was quite extraordianary, but we don't want to get ahead of our-


Uneducated workers receive risky jobs at chemical plants, study reveals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some of the most risky and hazardous work in the petrochemical industry is being assigned to inex-perienced and uneducated contract workers who may have trouble understanding English, said a study Tuesday prompted by a plant explosion that killed 23 people.
"The least prepared workers

in the petrochemical industry are often performing some of its most dangerous work and experiencing a significantly higher proportion of injuries than their more experienced direct-hire counterparts," the study said.



NASA reschedules lift off

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA's countdown clock started ticking again for the launch of space shuttle Atlantis afteril was grounded for more than a week by a faulty engine computer. Atlantis is scheduled to lift off at 11:01 a.m. Thursday on a nine day mission to put a communications satellite into orbit. The

countdown began Monday. "Everything's going well right now," test director Mike Leinbach said Tuesday. "We're not tracking any problems that would prevent us from getting to a launch attempt Thursday morning." Even the weather outlook was favorable. Forecasters put the

odds of good weather Thursday at 80 percent. Atlantis' first countdown was halted hours before liftof Wednesday after the computer that controls one of the three main engines failed. The \$4 million component was replaced with spare, NASA said.

Technicians also installed a new data-transmitting unit on an other engine because the old one was unreliable, NASA said.

the state cannot take tax money from one district and give it another. The county education districts combine these areas in a single district which is the taxable.

CoEds under S.B. 351 wer drawn so each district has a proximately equal wealth student, Moore said. The tricts inject more revenue in the Texas school system.
