Other notable employees making more than \$100,000 a year are: Dr. Charles Arntzen, dean of the College of Agriculture, \$163,770; Dr. Benton Cocanougher, dean of the College of Business, \$141,528; Dr. John Fackler, dean of the College of Science, \$119,880; Dr. Daniel Fallon, dean of the College of Library of the College of Library and the College of Libra lon, dean of the College of Liberal Arts, \$111,602;

Dr. E. Dean Gage, provost and vice president for academic affairs, \$148,000; Dr. Michael Mc-Carthy, dean of the College of Architecture, \$102,204; Dr. John Shadduck, dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine, \$140,558; and Shelby Metcalf, senior representative for University relations. resentative for University relations, \$100,000.

In addition to the salary list, A&M released a list of perks for its leaders. Mobley and Dr. John Koldus, vice president for student services, receive free housing, while DeVaul receives \$25,000 in housing and car allowances from local gift funds.

Some A&M officials also use a University purchased car in

University-purchased car, including Mobley, Hiler, General Counsel James Bond and Dr. Eddie Davis, deputy chancellor for finance and administration.

Using local funds, or fee-generated money, the System also has paid country club dues at Briarcrest Country Club for Mobley, Bond, DeVaul, Coca-naugher, Davis, former Univer-sity President Frank Vandiver, Associate Business Dean R. Malcolm Richards and Vice President for Finance and Administration Robert Smith. All yearly memberships are \$1,740.



Kellogg to rename

banned cereal

AUSTIN (AP) - A cereal taken off Texas store shelves by state officials because they said it was mislabeled and made false health claims may soon reappear under a different name, officials

under a different name, officials said Tuesday.

Kellogg Co. has renamed its Heartwise cereal to Fiberwise.

The Texas attorney general's office and health department have been fighting Kellogg, the world's leading producer of ready to eat cereal, since last year over Heartwise over Heartwise.

State officials contend that Kellogg was advertising Heart-wise for medicinal purposes, and that the so-called medicinal ingredient, psyllium, was a po-tent laxative that had a history of serious allergic reactions in some users and had not been approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration.






