ustin-based four-piece the Duckhills perform tonight at AnNam Tea House. The roup may lack a little on the muical ability side, but their debut release Remembering Spongecake nows that the band can make up for it with truly hilarious humor.

is "Political," a song which should close the band's performance tonight. After explaining his crazy inspiration for a new message for the masses, McDonald belts out his visionary (ha!) phi-

losophy: "I think apartheid Sunday afternoon: "I'm a 'lil bit is bad... I think world peace is girlish, I don't like to do boy- good...I think starvation is real

bad..." To spew off the rest of the lyrics would ruin the show, but it definitely gets better.

The Duckhills have been in the studio, hoping to release a followup in late October, and they plan to play a showcase at the New South Conference in Atlanta earlier that month. Their humor has won them a good-size audience in Austin, and the show tonight should be full of laughs.

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This Way", "I'm the Man" was the first attempt for a complete crossover between hard metal and rap, recorded back in early 1987.

The new version updates the song, bringing in the harder drum and bass lines common in today's hardline rap. It's good to see that the song that gave Anthrax respect in the rap community is getting a much needed revamping.

After four years, the song still holds as one of the best white rap songs ever. Let's see Vanilla Ice top this! "I'm the Man" follows "Bring the Noise" as one of the best cuts on the album. The guys should really think about releasing this as their second single.

Back to some old material, included here are two live tracks from 1990s Persistence of Time. Both "Keep It in the Family" and "Belly of the Beast" benefit from the live treatment, as anyone who's been to an Anthrax show can tell you. Needless to say, these tracks rock, and the live versions are a lot rawer than the studio tracks. These tracks, along with "Chromatic Death" (a S.O.D. song, and former theme to MTV's Headbangers Ball) show that the band has definitely not lost

their metal edge.

The two new songs on the album, "Startin' Up a Posse" and "N.F.B." are the funniest and most cynical songs here. "Posse" provides a tongue in cheek acoustic ditty, using all the words designed to get themselves the coveted Parental Advisory sticker. As Steven Tyler

said, "It always guarantees a few thousand extra sales."

"N.F.B." provides a typical rock ballad. I'll let you figure out the acronym. What's surprising here is that the song is done with a fairly straight face. Despite inane lyrics ("I never meant to hurt you/ Or sleep with all your friends.") the song is exactly like the Poisionslaughte-rnelson garbage that's been giving metal a bad name.

And besides, don't we get the same kind of lyrics by bands doing this seriously? Apparently the band wrote this song in 10-minutes to show how easy it is, but the scary thing is that if this was the next single it would probably make the MTV

Top Ten. In addition to these previous tracks, cover songs ranging from "Protest and Survive" by early '80s hardcore band Discharge to "Parasite" on KISS' "Hotter Than Hell " album and you've got the key to this album and Anthrax in general: variety

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
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
