sulting from alcohol consumption is dehydration.

"Students drink the day of or the night before the game, and the alcohol dehydrates them," he said. "This is especially a problem during hot weather and afternoon games."

Frances Gough, a registered nurse at the health center, works the first-aid station during football games and said some cases of dehydration need extra care.

"It is a real problem because severe dehydration can create problems for people," she said. "We send the serious cases to the emergency room for fluid replacement."

Dudley Wait, chief of Emergency Medical Services, said the number one cause of all emergency calls to EMS on home game weekends is alcohol-related.

"Our number of calls drastically increases on home game weekends," he said. "At least one alcohol overdose case is treated during each Friday night yell practice — guaranteed."

The EMS staff is increased on home game weekends because of the high number of problems, Wait said.

"We have two ambulances — only one is kept fully staffed at all

times," he said. "During game weekends, we keep both vehicles fully staffed because of the increase in emergency calls."

Wait also said the problem is worse for the first yell practice game because a number of freshmen are having their first drinking experience during this weekend.

"We get a lot of new kids coming in who are experimenting with alcohol and who usually overdo it," he said.

Wait encouraged anyone going to the LSU game to drink responsibly and consume a lot of water before going out into the heat Saturday.

gins after the spring semester ends."

Joseph Reising, a graduate student in finance and president of the Graduate Student Council, said despite initial misunderstandings, the University has been very cooperative.

"There has been a one-year moratorium placed on the project to allow the graduates living in the duplexes time to come up with alternate plans," Reising said. "This allows the residents nine months to find a place to live that fits in their limited budgets, and

save up for a down payment if they need to."

"It's unreasonable for us to ask the University not to tear down the duplexes, considering their terrible condition," he said. "But considering the fact the University was tearing them all down before giving the students time to adjust, (this) is a good compromise."

Despite the compromise, Reising said, graduate student housing at A&M leaves much to be desired.

"There just isn't enough low-rent housing for graduates," he

said. "It would be nice to have specially-designed graduate student housing. I don't know if we'll ever get it, but it would be a nice recruiting tool to have even just a wing of a dorm designated for graduate students."

Powell said a decision has not been reached on what the land will be used for once the demolition is complete.

"At this point, no one has told me of any plans for the property," Powell said. "All we know is that the project to clear the land is going strong."

Dr. E. Dean Gage, provost and senior vice president for A&M, said the project is one of the most impressive ever undertaken at the University.

"This will be the largest academic building project ever at this University," Gage said. "It (the new complex) has been over ten years in the process from the first plans to the ground breaking ceremony on Friday."

A team of inspectors from the AVMA was expected to be on campus this week to decide

if A&M would regain full accreditation, but the visit was postponed by the college because it had little to show the inspectors at this time other than plans for the

complex.

The college had originally requested that the team come this year rather than in 1993 so that they could put the accreditation questions behind them, but delays in the new project forced the college to postpone the visit.

"We had a series of delays in getting our new building started," Shaddock said "It took longer to do the design phase than we had planned on."

"At the time we arranged the visit for this September, we thought that we would be considerably further along with the building than we really are. So when we informed the visitors of where we are, they asked to postpone the visit."

"Even without any delay in the building, given the budget situation on the campus this year we would have suggested that the delay their visit and let us work out our budget problems over the next couple of years," Shaddock said.

Shaddock does not expect the new facility to be finished by November of 1993, but he does believe that the AVMA will restore full accreditation when it sees that the problems it cited in 1988 are being addressed by the college.

The College of Veterinary Medicine has more than 1,800 students enrolled in three programs within the college, and has a combined yearly budget in excess of \$30 million.
