## Restaurant faces parking difficulties City council pushes back decision to approve additional lot

The College Station City Council voted to delay a decision to build a parking lot which would hold the overflow from the new Chili's Grill and Bar during its Thursday night meet-

After listening to representatives of Chili's and local residents, the City Council voted to push the decision back 90 days.

Tim Fox, director of Regional Construction for Chili's Restaurants, said the restaurant needs an additional 32 spaces to handle their high volume of business

Patrons presently park in College Station Municipal Building parking lots or in front of nearby houses when the Chili's lots fill.

When Chili's opened last month, management considered the number of parking spaces adequate. The restaurant, however, received
