A&M, SWT offer joint course for teachers

Texas A&M and Southwest Texas State University received a \$409,000 joint grant from the U.S. Department of Education this fall to fund a summer geography academy for teachers.

The grant, one of 18 nationwide, created the Governor's Geography Academy for Teachers. Gov. Ann Richards endorsed the joint proposal last summer.

Next summer, the Texas A&M/Southwest State academy will offer 40 Texas teachers a fourweek training period in geographic education. Participants will be at Southwest for the first two weeks and at A&M for the last two weeks.

Dr. Robert Bednarz, an associate professor of geography for A&M and co-director of the academy, said the course will concentrate on leadership skills and staff development.

The teachers will be required to conduct three in-service sessions for their colleagues after they complete the course, Bednarz said. If each participant reaches 600 teachers who teach 100 students apiece, then approximately 60,000 students will benefit, he

Bednarz said he expects more than 200 applicants for the 40 positions, and those chosen will represent a geographical, ethnic and grade-level mix.

Bednarz said this program is different than previous geography programs at A&M because it is the first joint program that A&M has been involved in and four different departments will be involved.

Both A&M's and Southwest's geography departments and educational instruction departments will be involved, he said

Also, this course is different,

convey what they learned here to largest group of teachers and will last longer than the other programs A&M has offered.

Usually, there are 30 teachers involved, and the classes last three weeks," he said.

Dr. Lynn Burlbaw, an A&M assistant professor for the Department of Education Curriculum and Instruction, said he will do evaluations of the academy's

progress. Next fall, he said, evaluators will go to the participants' classes and in-services to see if they are properly teaching what they have

"We want to see if their teaching is changing and if the students are learning geography better," Burlbaw said.

He said this program will be different from the others because the classroom visits have never been done before.

'We used to send questionnaires, but we've never had inschool follow-ups," he said.


