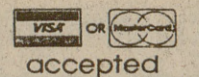

Basketball team avoids serious injury

A&M coach Tony Barone said the team was lucky to have escaped further injury.

"I don't believe people understand how terrible a situation it was," Barone said. "People die from carbon monoxide."

Barone said Sunday the team was still shaken by the events of the previous day.

"These young men had something happen that couldn't be explained at first," he said. "Then you compound the problem with

fear, and it makes for a tougher situation.

"The next thing you know a person is trying to put an oxygen mask on your face and you're having blood withdrawn from your arm. It was a scary situation."

The fumes originated in a heating unit and spread to the visiting locker room, the officials' locker room and the hospitality area.

Buonaguro collapsed at approximately 7 p.m. after inhaling the fumes in A&M's locker room.

Ricke immediately began to administer aid to Buonaguro.

A&M players had already left the locker room to warm up when they began to feel the effects of inhaled fumes.

About 4,000 spectators were evacuated from the arena after carbon monoxide was discovered.

The A&M vs. Baylor game will be rescheduled at a later date.

The status of the A&M vs. Texas Southern game scheduled for Wednesday, Jan. 22, will be determined today, according to Barone.

Parties back annexation

an independent Palestinian state. Supported by militant Jewish settlers in the occupied lands, both parties want Israel to annex the territories, which were seized in the 1967 Middle East war.

Moledet also demands the expulsion of the 1.7 million Palestinians in the territories.

Shamir tried to reassure supporters of his right-wing Likud bloc during a television appearance Friday night, saying he insists on Israel retaining sovereignty over the occupied lands after a five-year period of autonomy.

Appearing on the same show, Shimon Peres, head of the Labor

Party, called for Israel to withdraw from the territories after the interim autonomy period. He said that should be followed by a confederation between Jordan and the Palestinian areas.

With polls saying most Israelis support the peace talks, Shamir said he expected to go forward in the negotiations before the elections. But a caretaker government would not have a mandate to make far-reaching decisions on peace.

Sunday, Peres called for the talks to be suspended until after the elections. He said on Israel radio that negotiations now would be nothing but a "show" for voters.

Lillian Robinson, center director, spoke during the tribute on the subject "Will Diversity = Op-

portunity + Advancement of Blacks?"

Robinson said the basic idea of her speech was that anyone can rise above their present state and improve their lives. She said she believes in many of Dr. King's philosophies, which helped her with the idea for her speech.

"We can improve and we can advance, but we must be prepared for what lies ahead," she said.

Robinson said she hopes people who attended the musical gained an understanding of what Dr. King stood for, and will remember it.

the construction to end. The garage opened six months ago.

Busch said the center is presently undergoing what he calls the "punchlist stage" in which each room is inspected for details.

"We're just finishing the punchlist now," he said. "Actual construction was completed in December."

Busch said administrators are now discussing a possible grand opening celebration

for the center to be held in conjunction with the annual MSC Open House at the beginning of February.

He said the center has received a lot of "oohs and ahhs" from visitors who admire the bridge connecting the center with Rudder Tower, the University seal set in the floor of the main lobby, and the rich, wooded interior of the center.

The center is very student-oriented, Busch said, especially the plaza surrounding the fountain.

"We hope students will use the fountain area for outdoor programming such as shows and tables," he said. "It's finished, thank goodness, and we encourage everyone to come out and look at it."

Congress considers releasing JFK files

WASHINGTON (AP) - A consensus is emerging to open sealed congressional files on the murder of John F. Kennedy, but the chairman of the former House assassinations committee predicted the records will not produce new evidence.

"The files don't contain information that alters publicly disclosed information," Rep. Louis Stokes, D-Ohio, said in an interview. "Those contending there's something in those records that covers up something will be abysmally disappointed."

Stokes said last week that he's exploring "the possibility of a resolution that would authorize release" of the files.

The pressure to open the files followed release of Oliver Stone's movie "JFK," which suggested that Kennedy was the victim of a conspiracy when he was shot in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963.

The assassination committee, led by Stokes, concluded in 1979 that Kennedy was the victim of a probable conspiracy that could have involved organized crime figures.

Others publicly supporting release of the files include former President Gerald Ford, a member of the Warren Commission that investigated the assassination. Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind.; Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine; and former FBI and CIA director William Webster.

"I had not seen anything that could not be released on national security grounds," Webster said.

A spokeswoman for Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said the family would not oppose release of the files.

"The family has no control over any of these files," said Melody Miller. "They prefer to stay out of that debate. But they have not stood in the way of any investigation in the past nor would they in the future. It's just too painful to get involved."

The assassination committee's final report concluded that John Kennedy was the victim of a probable murder conspiracy.
