It may prove to be a better Olympiad this year because of improved organizational and man-agement skills, he said. "We envision that the majority

of those problems will be resolved now that we have moved back to the original facilities that they were held in," Hernandez said.

Since Greek shows are usually held in gyms, the cushioned seats and improved sound quality of Rudder Auditorium will provide a nice surprise for some guests.

"We emphasized in our pamphlets the comfort and quality of the facility," Quarles said.

Hernandez said constant rein- (the story so far . . .) forcement takes a lot of publicity and public relations work because people expect a real "hyped" show




