Second half run boosts Kansas past Oklahoma

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — Eric Pauley had a career-high 23 points and 12 rebounds and helped key a 17-4 run Monday night that broke open a tight game and carried No. 3 Kansas to an 84-65 victory over Oklahoma.

Pauley, a 6-foot-10 junior, scored eight points in the 5-minute spree and Adonis Jordan, a 5-11 point guard, scored six as Kansas (21-3, 9-2) won its 15th straight Big Eight game at home.

The Jayhawks also swept their two-game series with the Sooners

for the first time since 1986.

Oklahoma (17-7, 5-6), boosted by Terry Evans' offensive burst, pulled back to 52-50 on Damon Patterson's basket. But then Pauley, working inside most of the night, made a basket and Jordan hit a 3-pointer to put the Jayhawks in control.

Jordan finished with 22 points while Rex Walters, who had been battling a shooting slump, had 18.

Evans, who had just three points in the first half, finished with 25 and Patterson had 19.

"It's quite different now.

"Cycling is still perceived as an international sport and it is. It's just not a mainstream American sport by any means. It's getting closer and closer to that."

The U.S.-based Motorola team proved last year that an American team other than Team 7-11 could compete abroad and win. Motorola is ranked 12th in the world going into this season, and has signed Texan Lance Armstrong to a contract that begins after he rides in the Olympics.

Armstrong is one of the top young riders in the country.

"LeMond is obviously someone very special, but Motorola has proven that (an entire American team) can compete internationally," Simes said. "They are a totally accepted team in the European peloton."

This racing season gives cycling much needed exposure in the U.S.

"We've had a milestone step

forward in cycling in the Western Hemisphere," Simes said. "We now have our own calendar of international events between North and South America that will score points (toward World Cup standing)."

"That means our teams no longer have to go to Europe to score points. They can race here."

Lynn Pettyjohn, manager of the Coors Light racing team, sees things a little differently.

"The influence will be minimal at best," Pettyjohn said. "The amount of points you can score in the United States are minuscule relative to Europe. About 85 percent of the points are in Europe."

"The addition of races over here just means that some of the bigger races the Europeans can come over and get points here."

Regardless of who gets the points, racing on the North American continent offers exposure and that can translate into corporate sponsorship for riders who need the support.

Maybe some will save enough money for a plane ticket.

part of a special panel with Marvin Tate, mayor of Bryan; Larry Ringer, mayor of College Station; Dr. Emily Ashworth, assistant provost of international programs; Tina Watkins, director of International Student Services; Mordica Artzieli, consul general of Israel; International Student Association president Rhonda Bolich; and opening ceremonies director Harsh Jagga.

During the ceremonies, a song entitled "Hope" was performed by Mariari Sargwade, emphasizing this year's theme for the week, "Hope in a changing world." Students and children in international costumes joined in the singing.

Ringer and Tate both said they were pleased to be a part of the ceremonies, and pressed appreciation to international students for what they bring to the community.

Ringer compared the events to the Winter Olympics.

"What we share this week is much of the same spirit of individuality from many cultures bringing their different cultures to us," he said.

Both mayors presented a proclamation to the ISA stating that Feb. 24-28 is International Student Week in Bryan and College Station, and urged citizens to welcome students from other countries.

At the opening ceremony Watkins gave a brief history of international week, and explained its importance.

In 1980, the celebration was one day, instead of one week. Watkins said there were many events the celebration would last until past midnight so international day became international week.

An international buffet will be held Wednesday from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. in the MSC. Tickets are \$8, and are available at the MSC Box Office.

A talent show and traditional dress parade will be held Friday at 8 p.m. in Rudder Auditorium. Tickets are \$3.50, and tickets for both the international buffet and talent show are \$10. The "End of Week Party" and awards ceremony are also on Friday, at the College Station conference Center on George Bush Drive. Admission is \$1 for ISA members and \$2 for non-ISA students.
