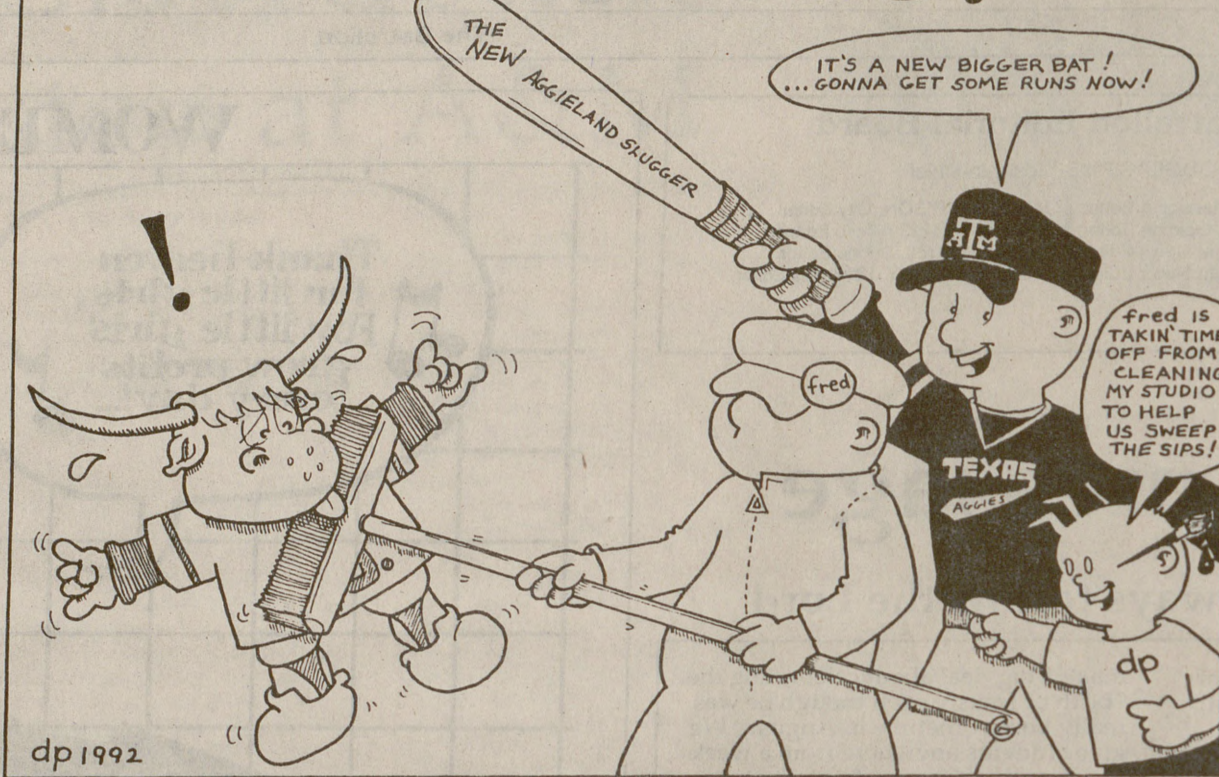

### Warriors slap Mavs, 110-91

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Chris Mullin scored 29 points and the Golden State Warriors cruised past the Dallas Mavericks 110-91 on Wednesday night to snap a two-game losing streak.

After consecutive losses to the Western Conference-leading Portland Trail Blazers, the Warriors opened a one-game lead over the Phoenix Suns and the Utah Jazz in the race for the conference's second-best record. The Warriors played the Suns on Saturday night.

Golden State shot just 42.5 percent from the field, but made 33 of 43 free throws. The Mavericks, who lost their third straight and 18th in their last 20, made 37.8 percent of their shots from the field and equalled the lowest point total of a Golden State opponent this season.

Rookie Chris Gatling scored a career-high 18 points and Billy Owens and Tim Hardaway each added 13 points for the Warriors. Sarunas Marciulionis did not play.

Mike Izzulino and Herb Williams scored 14 points apiece to lead Dallas.

### Elliott plays with injury, leads Spurs past Lakers

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) — Adhesive tape played a key role in the San Antonio Spurs' 102-94 victory over the Los Angeles Lakers on Thursday night.

Spurs forward Sean Elliott, who dislocated the little finger on his right hand April 1 against the Lakers, entered the rematch in a shooting slump.

In Tuesday's 95-92 loss to Houston, Elliott made only one of 10 shots and finished with just five points.

Against Los Angeles, however, Elliott scored a season-high 33 points, success he attributed to a minor change in the way his finger was taped.

"After the injury, I played three games with my pinkie and ring fingers taped together and I just couldn't get a grip on the ball," Elliott explained. "I had missed so many open shots that I decided to tape the pinkie by itself and it really made a difference tonight."

"I felt like myself again."

Elliott, who had 23 points in the first half, was 14 of 19 from the floor and played all 48 minutes in the win over the Lakers.

Terry Cummings had 22 points and 12 rebounds for San Antonio.

With the defeat, the Lakers fell one-half game behind the Houston Rockets for the eighth and final Western Conference playoff berth. The Rockets defeated Minnesota 107-102.

"Obviously this was a very disappointing loss for us," Lakers coach Mike Dunleavy said. "It was an important game and unfortunately, we came out flat. Cummings' tip-in gave the Spurs an 88-78 lead with 8:39 left before the Lakers closed to 90-86 with an 8-2 run, capped by Sedale Threatt's 17-foot jumper with 5:39 remaining."

With 2:05 left, Terry Teagle, who finished as the Lakers' leading scorer with 18 points, hit a short jumper to pull Los Angeles to 94-92.

### Olajuwon, Rockets win 4th straight

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Hakeem Olajuwon scored 26 points and sparked a 23-9 fourth-quarter run with a backboard-shaking jam Thursday night as the Houston Rockets won their fourth consecutive game, 117-102 over the Minnesota Timberwolves.

Otis Thorpe had 24 points and 13 rebounds for the Rockets (41-36), who moved a half-game ahead of the Los Angeles Lakers for the eighth and final Western Conference playoff berth. The Lakers were beaten by San Antonio on Thursday.

Backups Sleepy Floyd and Avery Johnson also played a major role after point guard Kenny Smith couldn't return from an ankle injury sustained late in the first half. Floyd scored 19 points, including two fourth-quarter 3-pointers; Johnson ran the offense, finishing with seven assists.

Pooh Richardson and Thurl Bailey scored 21 points apiece but combined for only one point in the fourth period as the Timberwolves lost for the 18th time in 21 games.

The Rockets trailed 84-83 early in the fourth when Olajuwon's rebound basket put them ahead for good. Floyd followed with a 3-pointer and Olajuwon with two free throws for a 90-84 lead.

the last 21 games. He has a more optimistic view of the slump.

"We haven't been hitting ball well lately," Hickey said. "It's better to struggle early in the season than it is to struggle late in the season."

"If you're hitting late in the season, it'll take you farther," Hickey has been given medical clearance to practice and could see some action against Longhorns.

Gonzalez thinks Hickey's return would help the team. "Hitting is contagious," Gonzalez said. "We have one of the best hitting ballclubs around. If everyone went into a slump at the same time."

"With Mike Hickey's return that should help us."

The pitching staff has a bright spot for the Aggies. Staff has given up 12 runs in last six games.

"We're just thinking about getting the job," said senior reliever son Hutchins. "When we're on the mound, we're not thinking about what the hitters are going to do."

"We just try to hold them to two runs a game. We try to hold them to two runs, we win."

One advantage the Aggies have is that the series is being held in College Station. The home field has been kind to the Aggie cent series' history.

A&M has won seven of nine games against the Longhorns at Olsen Field, including last year's three-game sweep.

"We've got the Aggies' advantage," said Hutchins. "It's a good thing we're pumped."

Williams agrees that the home field will give the Aggies an advantage, but only as long as they take care of business.

"Being at our park is going to give us a big advantage," he said. "But we still have to play a good game."

Since the Longhorns have a big lead over the rest of the conference, it's possible they will play the Aggies lightly.

"When you're 5 1/2 games up, you can overlook anyone," Williams said. "Right now, they don't think we're very good. We definitely haven't played up to level."

Gonzalez hopes the Longhorns will overlook the Aggies.

"They think we probably can't hit the slow stuff," he said. "I'm going to hit everything they throw at us."

"I do kind of hope they underestimate us."
