(Figueroa's) the first (cholera) case in Texas.

The case is apparently the first to hit Texas since the dreaded disease started its northward migration from Peru and Brazil, where hundreds of people died and thousands were infected in the

past year. A major outbreak of the disease started in Peru in January 1991, and has spread through South and Central America. Nearly 400,000 cases of cholera have been confirmed, including at least 4,000 deaths. In Mexico, more than 2,800

cases have been counted. Only five cases of cholera reported in Texas from 197 1988, and those were not the type of cholera that is curre being seen.
