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Longhorns dismiss Hadnot, cite grades

AUSTIN—Junior running back Butch Hadnot has been dismissed from the University of Texas for academic reasons, Longhorns head football coach John Mackovic says.

Hadnot satisfied NCAA standards with his summer school grades, but had not met minimum university standards, officials said.

"Butch did have an appeal, but it was not accepted. He has been told he has been dismissed from the university. He could be eligible to return in the spring," Mackovic said Tuesday.

A dean of communications indicated to Texas athletic department officials that Hadnot's history of poor class attendance was the primary reason for denying the appeal, The Dallas Morning News reported.

Hadnot's academic status has been under scrutiny since Texas Tech officials said he didn't have the grades to qualify for a scholarship, but Texas gave him

to the Stanford sideline as a coach, the eyes of the nation were on the Aggies to see if they make a national statement.

Slocum shied away from declaring this a make or break year for the Aggies.

"First of all, the hoopla is deserved," Slocum said. "Walsh is a credit to this game. There are other factors.

"This game will be positive regardless of the outcome. Our goal each year is to win the SWC. Walsh is another whole game to play for that."

During preparations, the Aggies had to rely on old game film of Stanford when Walsh coached the Cardinal in the 1970s. That presented a unique problem for the A&M coaching staff.

"It is tough because when you start looking at Bill Walsh over the last 13 or 14 years, it gives you a boat full of things to look at," Slocum said. "That's not what you want a young defensive team to have to cope with.

"His teams have always been good at running the football, and that presents to me as a big problem as the passing game."

The Cardinal can boast a Heisman Trophy candidate in running back Glyn Milburn. The senior, who can change direction at the drop of a dime, has the potential to give the aggressive Aggie defense problems.

But Bates feels that aspect of Milburn's game will not be a factor.

"Normally, guys like Sean Johnson from Florida State and Robert Strait from Baylor give us more trouble because they are bruising backs," he said.

"I think we have the speed and ability to match up well with Milburn's speed and his ability to cut."

While Stanford will employ mostly one-back passing sets, Bates also expects there will be some physical action as the Cardinal tries to grind out yards.

"We have faced everything the SWC, and they do a lot of trapping and smash-mouth football. We are a little concerned about that," Bates said.

"But we have seen it all at some point.

"They have a great offensive line, and they are so big up front, it could cause some problems. But I think we will be OK. We have to play our game and the rest will follow suit."

Walsh is impressed with A&M on both sides of the ball.

And he feels Stanford must find a way to disrupt the Aggies.

"I hope we do not get inundated with their overall balance, quickness or explosion," Walsh said. "We have a plan, but it could blow up in our face so we need to contain their big plays on offense and defense."

To win, the Aggies must control the clock with ball-control offense, Slocum said.

"The more shots you give your team, the better chance they have to win. We must execute."

With kickoff just hours away, all the preseason excitement will now melt into either happiness or sadness for A&M football fans.

Defensive lineman Eric England doesn't think A&M fans will be disappointed.

"This is a big game and a good opportunity to do something nationally and gain some respect," he said. "Everybody is watching and I do not think we will disappoint.

"This is our year."
