Americans had been returned from Laos.

At that time, Nixon had concluded peace talks with the North Vie namese. The government of Laos was not represented in the next tions. And Nixon was preparing to hold welcoming ceremonies U.S. POWs released under those Paris peace accords.

'We would have had to go to Laos . . . and physically sweep out whole area," Moorer said.

"We didn't have the stomach for it. We didn't have the will," M

Moorer testified before the Senate Select Committee on POW-Affairs as it held a third day of hearings with former military a Nixon administration officials from two decades ago.

Some former officials have testified there was reason to believe more Americans than the nine eventually released from Laos had be held in that country as a result of the fighting in Southeast Asia.

Former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger also acknowledged possibility there may have been more living Americans in Laos, thou he denounced as "a flat-out lie" the allegation U.S. officials knowing abandoned Americans there.
