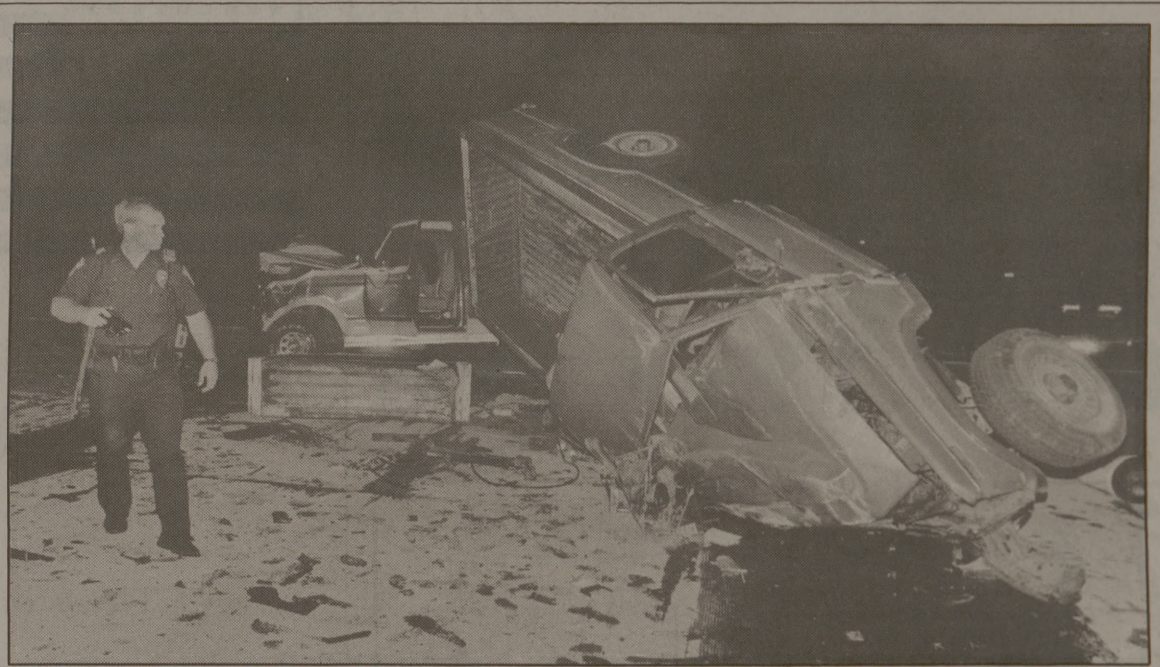

Study cites foster care weaknesses

HOUSTON - Nearly half the Texas children in foster care have spent more than two years in the limbo between their abusive or neglectful homes and adoption or permanent placement, according to a report published Sunday.

In an internal study done last year by Bennett Neiman with the Texas Department of Human Services, officials said the temporary stay is about four times longer than

it should be, the Houston Chronicle reported.

"The children are in limbo, naturally wanting to return to their own homes, or at least to a permanent place to live. Everyone seems to agree that this is psychologically devastating to them," the study concluded.

The Texas study had not been released to the public but was obtained by the Chronicle after Friday's ruling in Florida that allowed a 12-year-old boy to "divorce" his

parents, allowing him to be adopted by his foster family.

Gregory Kingsley had filed a lawsuit seeking to have the rights of his parents, Rachel and Ralph Kingsley, terminated. Florida Judge Thomas Kirk agreed to end the parents' rights and approved the adoption by his foster parents.

Of 7,861 children in foster care at the end of the state's 1991 fiscal year, 44 percent were in foster care longer than two years, records show.

Lead exposure poses threat to Texas workers, report says

HOUSTON - Thousands of Texas workers are routinely exposed to high levels of lead, which can cause everything from elevated blood pressure to brain damage, according to health department data collected over the last six years.

The Houston Chronicle reported Sunday that records compiled by the Texas Department of Health show that harmful lead exposures can occur in a wide variety of businesses,

including battery-assembly plants, foundries and indoor shooting ranges.

The Texas Occupational Disease Reporting Act has required record keeping of lead exposure to workers since 1985.

Through 1991, those records show 1,126 cases of elevated blood-lead levels in adults from 101 companies were reported to the state health department.

Although state officials don't know how many cases went unreported during the period, Dr. Dennis Perrotta, the health department's chief of epidemiology said, "We are

quite pleased with what we've been able to do with the information we've got."

By law, doctors and laboratories in Texas must report any worker lead level at or above 40 micrograms per deciliter (mcg/dl) of blood.

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration also requires close medical monitoring of workers who register at that level, except those in construction.

OSHA requires all lead-manufacturing and lead-using companies to conduct air monitoring and, if lead levels are high enough, to collect blood samples from workers.

Hemlines rise, eyebrows raise on BYU campus

PROVO, Utah - It all started with a seemingly harmless concession to modern fashion two years ago, when straight-laced Brigham Young University decided to allow knee-length shorts.

Now it's possible to catch a glimpse of thigh on the Mormon campus and students are better warned the rising hemlines of shorts and skirts must subside. Lee said violators aren't expelled nor is their tuition raised; their hemlines aren't lowered. But they may lose other privileges.

A sign at the Harold B. Lee Library states that, beginning Oct. 1, it will "only serve those students who abide by the honor code."

Other encouragement came from a poster showing young men and women in knee-length shorts standing around a red sports car. The caption says "Don't sell yourself short." The license plate on the car reads "2ZNEEZ."

Students are encouraged to confront violators and, if necessary, turn them in to the Honor Code Council for counseling.

A pamphlet for new students says revealing clothing is prohibited and that shorts and skirts should be "knee-length or lower." Men may not sport long hair or beards.

The 1990 change in the dress code allowed both women and men to wear knee-length shorts. Previously, women could wear slacks or skirts and men were required to wear trousers.

On a recent afternoon, perhaps a dozen students among hundreds bustling around the campus commons wore shorts of skirts that ranged from just above the knee to midthigh - modest by most standards but not BYU's.

While most students seem to support and comply with the dress code, some say the school might be indulging in a double standard. Recent letters to the editor in the student newspaper questioned the propriety of the short skirts worn by BYU cheerleaders - given the dress-code for other students.

Jean Taylor, honor code assistant to the dean of student life, said the moral climate is what sets the school apart from most other colleges.
