School slow to act on assault punishment, attorney says

HOUSTON — School officials have failed to punish seven teen-age boys suspected of sexually assaulted a special education student at a Houston middle school, an attorney for the seventh-grade girl said.

L. Mickle Daniels, a Houston lawyer representing the 12-year-old girl and her mother, said a group of students aged 13 to 15 pulled the girl into a boys' bathroom at E.O. Smith Middle School during school hours on Sept. 28.

Once inside, he says, the three boys held her down while four took turns raping her.

Daniels also said a teacher walked in on the assault and, after telling the students to get dressed, agreed not to report it when the boys told him it would never happen again.

"They never called the police or anything else on the little boys," he said. "They (told the girl's mother), 'Your daughter was assaulted and we're going to investigate it,' and that's it."

Houston school officials have confirmed they are

investigating a "series of sexual episodes" involving the girl and the boys. But it was still unclear if they were investigating the matter.

Daniels said he would talk to a deputy superintendent about the incidents Monday.

Houston Independent School District spokeswoman Vernell Jessie said the district found that some of the boys had sexual intercourse with the girl in the bathroom during school hours and at another location.

Daniels and the girl's mother said Saturday they were outraged by the actions of the staff at the northeast Houston school.

"They were all acting like, 'Oh that happened, big deal!'" Daniels said. "It's as if it would be swept under the rug."

Daniels says the girl was sexually assaulted again on her way home by two of the boys behind the school's stadium bleachers.

The attorney said the boys threatened to kill the girl if she told anyone about it.

The attorney said the incidents were brought to

Deaths drug related, neighbors say

DALLAS — Four people died Sunday in a shooting spree at a house in an area where some neighbors said drug activity was taking place.

The victims were two brothers, a male friend and a woman described as one of the brothers' grandmothers, police said.

The pregnant wife of one of the male victims discovered the bodies about 1 p.m. Sunday in the kitchen of the house in Dallas' southeast-side Oak Cliff section.

Dallas police Sgt. Bobby Little said one of the relatives came over here to the house to pick up one of the victims to carry him somewhere with them. When they went in the house, they found the four people shot.

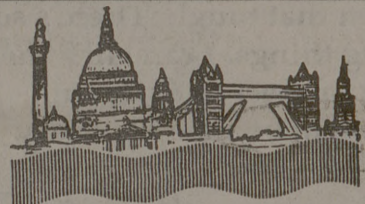
Homicide detectives said the three men were in

their early to mid-20s, with the grandmother in her mid-60s. The dead were not immediately identified pending notification of all next-of-kin.

"We were down there when one of the mothers-in-law called and said they found the two brothers dead," said Ivis Cleveland, a neighbor who was one of the first to enter the home after the shootings.

"When I came in there, I saw that all four of them were dead and two of them were face-down and two of them were on their backs," he said. "Everybody's in suspense now. What happened to them?"

Some neighbors, who asked not to be identified, told WFAA-TV that the deaths were drug-related. Several Dallas homicide detectives were working late Sunday to confirm a motive in the shooting deaths.

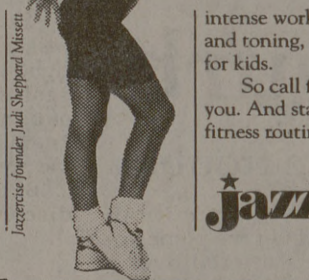
