New student theater group gains skills, puts on production of Horton Foote play

The Fallout Theater production of Horton Foote's play "Courtship" opens tonight in 144 Blocker.

The entire production is organized and run by A&M students who are part of the American Laboratory Theater Project. The project, which began this semester, accepts 10 theater arts students

every semester to coordinate productions at the Fallout Theater throughout the year.

Senior Steven De Korne is the production manager of the Fallout Theater. De Korne, who plays Mr. Vaughn in "Courtship," said the program has given him a more structured theater experience.

"The program has given me an all-around education," he said. "I'm not learning just one aspect of the show. When I graduate, I'll be able to get a job in administration, such as box office manager or production manager."

Holly Hill, costume designer for the play, said she enjoyed learning about the style of dress and the different class structures that existed at the turn of the century.

Hill said she began researching at the beginning of the summer to find patterns for costumes of the early 1900s.

"Research is very important in order to get a correct look on stage," she said.

The play is set in the small make-believe Texas town of Harrison in 1915, and surrounds the

fictional Vaughn family. The oldest daughter, Elizabeth, who is in her early twenties, plans to marry a young man named Horace despite her parents' disapproval.

Jessica Lowe, who plays Elizabeth, said the play is modern compared to its time setting, and that the Vaughn family is not very typical of the early 1900s.

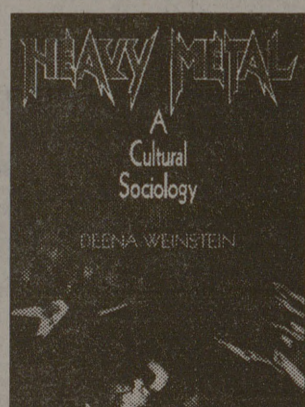
For example, Elizabeth attended two years of college before becoming a piano teacher, and her younger sister Laura was sent to boarding school for her high school education.

Because "Courtship" has a progressive angle, Lowe said she feels most students will enjoy the play.

"Though in a different time period, it's one of the few plays that has been locally written," she said. "It's something that's a part of our heritage."
