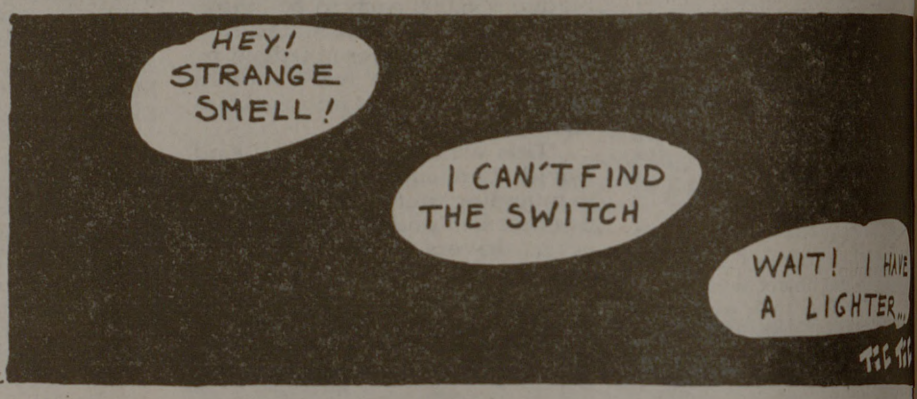

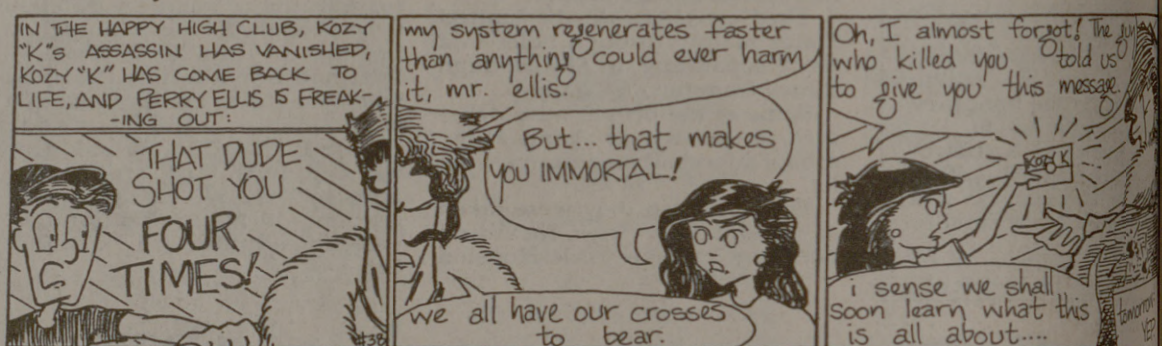

## Houston museum hosts collection of funeral industry memorabilia

HOUSTON—A new museum opening this week in Houston dwells on a subject some people spend their lives avoiding, but operators think others will be dying to get a look.

The American Funeral Service Museum opens its doors Thursday with the nation's largest collection of items marking the development of the funeral home industry in the United States.

"Funeral service is a fascinating topic that many people are curious about, but few know much about," says Robert Waltrip, founder and chairman of Houston-based Service Corporation International, the largest owner and operator of funeral homes in North America.

The museum is his idea.

"To my knowledge, no one else has tried to capture and preserve very much of the history of funeral service," he says. "We thought it was time to do it before an important part of the past is lost and forgotten."

"The industry, the profession, is one people are reluctant to deal with because it's death," adds Glenn McMillen, the museum president. "But people will come for a lot of different reasons. One will be for pure morbid curiosity. Others will come for learning experience. Some will come to see antique automobiles and horse-drawn vehicles."

Planning for the museum began 14 months ago. Earlier this year, museum organizers sent notices to nearly 35,000 funeral home directors asking them to clean out their back closets.

"The response from the industry has been outstanding, mainly because there's never been anything of this magnitude put together to chronicle our heritage," McMillen says.

The museum includes 23 horse-drawn or horse-drawn hearse funeral vehicles and one antique sleigh. The oldest is an 18th-century horse-drawn hearse. The most recent is a 1941 Ford hearse.

The funeral sleigh came from a funeral director in Oregon who found it in Pennsylvania.

Also on display are dozens of coffins and caskets, some predating the Civil War.
