## Lady Aggies upend UTSA

After going 1-2 in the first three matches of the week, the Texas A&M Lady Aggie volleyball team needed a win Saturday over the University of Texas-San Antonio to break even for the week.

Led by senior Elizabeth Edmiston and junior Kim Mitchell, the Lady Aggies were able to move their record to 15-13 on the season as they rallied from an 8-1 deficit in game five to defeat the Lady Roadrunners 15-9, 15-2, 11-15, 3-15, 15-13.

Edmiston and Mitchell paced A&M with 15 kills each to help the Lady Aggies take the non-conference match at the UTSA Convocation Center.

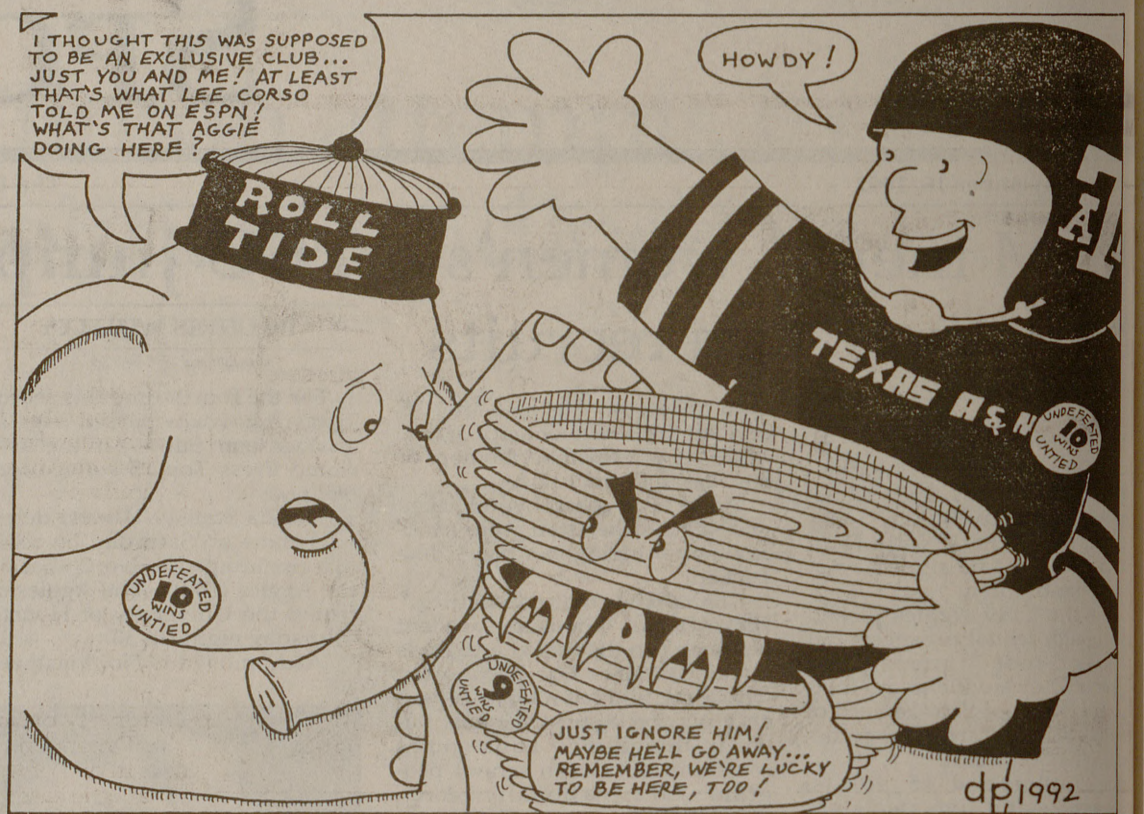
The Lady Aggies took the first two games easily, recording a .282 hitting percentage in game one and a .274 hitting percentage in game two.

But, despite hitting .357 in the third game, UTSA was able to take advantage of six errors from A&M to pull out a 15-11 win.

The Lady Roadrunners were paced by Leslie Dodson, who recorded a school-record 33 kills in the match.

The Lady Roadrunners took advantage of a meager .143 hitting percentage by A&M in game four to cruise to a 15-3 victory.

In game five, UTSA jumped out to the early 8-1 lead, only to see A&M fight back to tie the game then take a 13-11 lead. The Lady Roadrunners tied the game at 13, but kills by junior Sheila Morgan and Mitchell ended the game 15-13 and gave A&M the match victory.



## A&M swimmers fall in dual meet with SMU

Texas A&M's swimming teams both lost in their dual meets with Southern Methodist on Saturday in Downs Natatorium.

The men's team managed only 87 points to SMU's 156. Meanwhile, the Lady Mustang swim team amassed 152 points, which beat A&M's 91.

A&M head coach Mel Nash said that both of his teams had extremely good showings against the perennial powers from Dallas.

"We couldn't be more pleased with the way our kids swam unless we had won the meet," Nash said. "It was an excellent effort. We took our best shot at them, and they came in respecting that."

"Even though they were No. 8 last year, they didn't come in playing around and laying back. They came in ready to go."

A&M's 400-yard medley relay "A" team won with a 3:53.59 time. The team of John Hudspeth, Robert Fleming, Matt Michaels and Joe Vasquez edged out SMU's

"A" team by less than one second. "I was very pleased with the men's 400-medley relay," Nash said. "3:24 is an excellent time for November, and to win it, I think made SMU sit up and take notice."

A&M's Michael Rutledge won the 1,000-yard freestyle with a time of 9:35.03. Fleming took home first in the 100-yard freestyle in a time of 45.81. A Ryan McKinney's 2:07.16 time was good enough to win the 200-yard breaststroke.

However, Nash said that team's best performance was Ryan Goodwyn's fifth-place finish in the 1,000-yard freestyle.

"Swim of the Meet" had to be Ryan Goodwyn's 1,000 free, Nash said. "For Ryan to go as far and place as well as he did at the time of the year is phenomenal. He wasn't doing this well much further into the season last year couldn't be more pleased."

For the women, Susie Geyer won the 200-yard breaststroke with a time of 2:23.17. Also, the 400-yard free relay "A" team of Denean Knapp, Kim Smith, Jennifer Saul and Julie Bates had first-place time of 3:32.04.

"On the women's side, Susie Geyer had a great meet," Nash said. "The only senior we lost this year was Laura Grimes, and she is right on pace with Laura's time in dual meets last year."

"We swam 7,000 yards Saturday night before the meet. We've never swam SMU this well worked this hard right up to the meet."

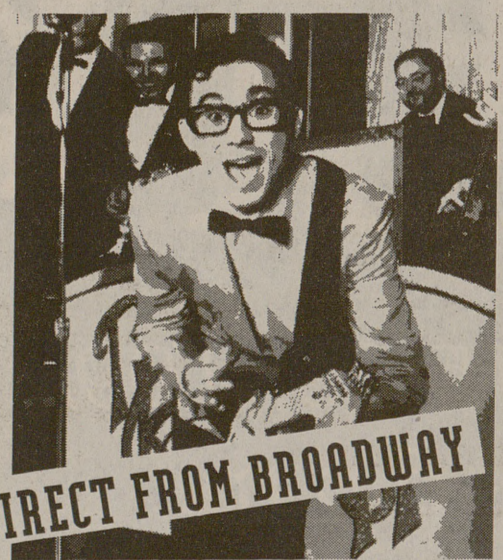

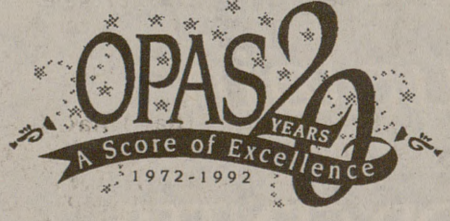

this season jumped ahead of Aggies this year.

This comes as a setback for A&M's chances at playing for national championship. Had the Aggies moved to No. 3, they would have been the next in line for a New Year's Day title showdown if No. 2 Alabama were to lose.

In recent weeks, Notre Dame name has come up as a possible opponent in this year's Cotton Bowl against the champion of the Southwest Conference. The Irish (8-1-1), who defeated No. 1 Boston College on Saturday, played in the 1988 Cotton Bowl against A&M and lost, 35-10.

The Aggies (5-0 in SWC) successfully defend their SWC title with victories on Saturday against Texas Christian and on Thanksgiving night against Texas. They could clinch this week. A&M wins and Texas (4-1 SWC) loses to Baylor in Waco Saturday.
