AUSTIN — Rep. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, was a lonely figure standing before the Texas House last week

Abandoned even by his own party, he was explaining that his school funding bill still needed work and wasn't ready for a vote after all.

"I don't have the support of this body. I can't pass this bill out," Ogden said. "It's such a new concept that it's poorly understood." What was readily understood
