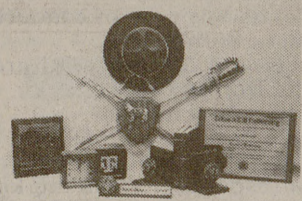

## Two Aggies offer students different kind of bookstore

Tired of the high textbook prices and selling them back for comparatively small amounts, two Texas A&M students have opened a business to offer students an alternative to the bookstores.

Neal Kirk, a senior computer science major from San Antonio, and Tim Hall, a junior geography major from Dallas, have named their business "The Book Match."

The inspiration for the business came when he saw a flier asking \$35 for a book he had just purchased for \$70, Kirk said.

"I hardly had any money, so when I saw that, I was really mad," Kirk said. "Then I began to think that I should sell my own books, and then I thought, 'Hey, I can sell everybody's books.'"

Right now, high book prices and low return at the end of the semester is the status quo, Hall said. Although Kirk and Hall will be taking a percentage of the profits (20 percent or \$5, whichever is the lesser amount), the pair says this system will still save everyone a lot of money.

"That's the status quo, but we want to change it and make this

the status quo," Hall said. "We want to save everyone a ton of money and stop the rip off."

"The Book Match" works through a data base and networks people who want to sell books with people who want to buy books. Students can name their selling and buying prices.

"It's a free market enterprise," Kirk said. "The books that are priced cheaper are the first books bought."

To use the service, students call Kirk and Hall and give them

the title, author, edition of the book to be sold or bought, the class for which it was or will be used, the approximate price at which they would like to sell or buy the book, and their name and phone number.

No handling of books is necessary until a match is made, and even then "The Book Match" offers free pickup and delivery. "The Book Match" is ready for fall books and spring orders and will be open during Christmas.

## Bryan Police seek culprits of vandalism

### CRIME STOPPERS

Sometime after midnight Saturday, Nov. 21 vandals ran through the Copperfield subdivision east of Bryan where they attacked four houses.

Evidence indicates that vandals wandered along Williamsburg, Knightsbridge, Huntington and Warwick streets using bricks to smash windows in houses that were under construction. A total of windows were broken out, at the estimate of damages exceed \$1,600.

Bryan police detectives believe the vandals live in the Copperfield area. Detectives have found no motive for the attack. The only known connection between the houses is that they were vacant and under construction.

This week the Bryan Police Department and Crime Stoppers need your help to identify the person responsible for the vandalism.

If you have information that could be helpful, call Crime Stoppers at 775-TIPS. When you call, Crime Stoppers will assign you a special coded number that will protect your identity.

If your call leads to an arrest and grand jury indictment, Crime Stoppers will pay you up to \$1,000 in cash.

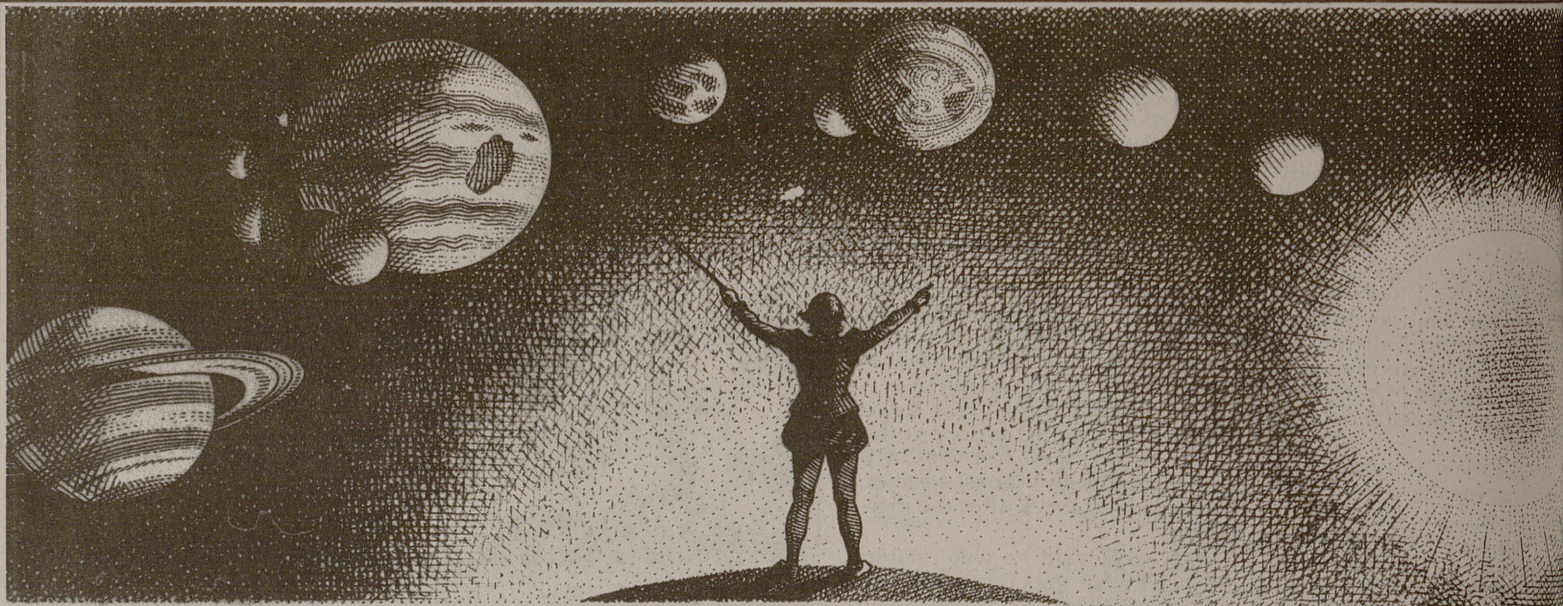
