choose between the University of Texas, which is ranked sixth in the report, and Texas A&M will look to the school's campus environment when making a decision, Fiechtner said.

"Freshmen who are interested in coming to A&M, especially those who are from out of the state, will find the ranking interesting," he said. "But when they are trying to decide between the University of Texas and A&M they will choose the campus they like best.'

Other top 10 universities in order of ranking are the University of Pennsylvania (Wharton), Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Indiana University, University of Michigan, University of California at Berkeley, University of Texas, New York University, Carnegie-Mellon University and

the University of Illinois. A&M's business school, at 25 years old, is the youngest of the group.

Both Robertson and Fiechtner said Texas A&M's School of Business Administration's Career Fair, which will be held from Jan. 31 through Feb. 5 in the Blocker Building, is also a major consideration as to why the ranking has made such a rapid jump.

"People are very impressed with our Career Fair and the fact that students run it," Robertson

Fiechtner said recruiters that attend the Career Fair take the ranking seriously, and some recruiters base how many jobs they will award students from a certain school based on these rank-

"We have to constantly show (Gourman) what people who hire our students think of our students and that we have a good, well-rounded program," Fiechtner said. "We're very pleased. It's a big leap."

# Free trade

For the state as a whole, fewer trade barriers with Mexico will spur related jobs to grow from 800,000 now to 1.1 million by 1995 and 1.6 million by 2000, the study

The segment of the gross state product tied to Mexican trade would jump from \$35.9 billion now to \$51.9 billion in 1995 and \$76.7 billion in 2000. Perryman unveiled the study,

perhaps the most sweeping look at the potential impact of freer Mexican trade on Texas cities, during the first stop of his annual four-city, four-day economic outlook conference.

Perryman, who describes himself as a "Texas chauvinist," has a reputation for rosier forecasts than other Texas economists. In December, University of North Texas economists Bernard Weinstein and Harold Gross warned that gains from NAFTA could be negligible unless state trucking

and other regulations are reformed

In singling out Dallas as the greatest potential beneficiary of freer trade with Mexico, Perryman cited the growth in the city of export-hungry telecommunications and electronics firms and the number of banks and other large financial institutions.

In descending order after Dallas, these cities will have the most jobs and income from greater Mexican trade: Austin, Brownsville-Harlingen, Houston, Fort Worth, El Paso, San Antonio, Lubbock and Tyler.

Perryman also made forecasts if NAFTA is not ratified by Congress but Mexico were to continue liberalizing trade and if Mexico were to hold the trade growth at present levels.

In both scenarios, Texas cities realize some gains, though much smaller, from trade with Mexico.

"The real thing that's causing the growth here is not just NAF-TA," Perryman said.

"It's the whole process that's taking place."
