happy to carry the A&M medallion with him during the shuttle mission.

"A&M is a well-recognized school and even while at Purdue, I knew and heard about it," he said..."I feel Purdue University is a mirror image to A&M, because like A&M, Purdue is a land grant school and is highly respected in agriculture, science, engineering and other areas.

"Doing something like this is something you have to have from day one, and this is not my life dream,' he said. "It has always been my father's dream."

Jerry said the German-managed mission has sev-eral purposes and is expected to be completed over nine to 10 days.

"We have experiments focusing on the environment on earth and will try to map it in more detail than we have now," he said. "Also, experiments focusing on how human bodies, plants and small animals are affected by microgravity (zero gravity) will be conducted.

Experimenting on the space environment will also be helpful in choosing building materials for future spacecraft, he said.

State courts refuse to halt execution

HUNTSVILLE - Two sta courts Monday refused to blo Texas officials from executing Dominican Republic man af midnight for killing a Houstor mored truck guard during a ro bery 12 years ago.

Carlos Santana, 40, was set lethal injection early Tuesday gunning down guard Oliver F res during an unsuccessful tempt to rob the truck of son \$1.1 million.

Santana contended the death his mother and loss of his is prompted him to get involved i the heist of the Purolator A mored Inc. van outside a Houst department store April 21, 1981.

A state judge in Houston a the Texas Court of Criminal A peals both refused Monday to l the execution, sending the mat to the federal courts.

The U.S. Supreme Court la week refused to review the case.

Santana's lawyers contended jurors were not allowed to consi er that Santana had been abu as a child and that he had lived great poverty.

They also contended jury i structions were improper, his la gal help was incompetent an that he wasn't told at the time of his arrest that he could contact the Dominican Republic consulate

Santana's case attracted the al tention of government officials the Dominican Republic, wh asked federal and Texas officia to intervene and spare Santana life.

A New York-based Commit to Save the Life of Carlos Santar sent more than 500 cards and le ters to Texas Gov. Ann Richard asking the execution be stopped Richards, however, has refus similar attempts in previous deal penalty cases.

"There's a whole lot going o but maybe it's not enough," Sa tana said in an interview la week. "The courts seem to more interested in expediting ex cutions than in dispensing ju tice.

Santana and an accomplia James Meanes, were arreste shortly after the noontime rob bery and shooting, convicted and sentenced to death. Meanes re-mains on death row although a has no execution date.

Flores was walking from the truck to the department stor when he was killed with a sing shot that went through his arm and body.

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
