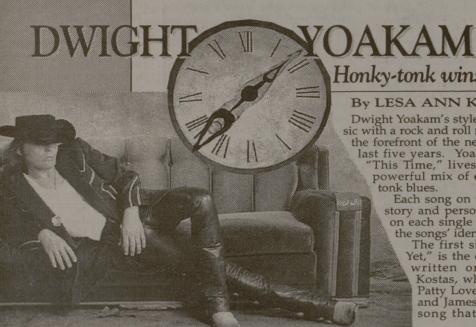
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## TWO HITS AND A MISS



Honky-tonk wins again 'This Time'

Dwight Yoakam's style of old-time honky-tonk music with a rock and roll mentality has brought him to the forefront of the new country movement in the last five years. Yoakam's new Reprise release, "This Time," lives up to his standard with a powerful mix of energy, passion and honky-

Each song on the album has its own style, story and personality. The instrumentation on each single also stands out and adds to the songs' identity.

The first single, "I Ain't That Lonely Yet," is the only song on the album not written or co-written by Yoakam. Kostas, who has written hit songs for Paty Loveless and others in Nashville, and James House wrote this powerful song that is rich with the standard

Queen's guitarist breaks out

Former Queen guitarist Brian May has been faced with the diffi-cult task of following up the suc-cess of a musical group which sold more than 100 million albums over

With his original and crafty debut solo album, "Back To The Light," May demonstrates that he may be up to the task.
The album features 12 tracks of intelligent, well-arranged rock n' roll augmented by clever explorations into other musical genres.

May wrote Queen classics such as "Keep Yourself Alive," "Tie Your Mother Down" and "We Will Rock You." But Queen has been no more since lead vocalist Freddie Mercury died of AIDS in 1990, and May has



May's first project, started five years ago, does not rest on his pre-vious musical laurels. "Back To The Light" offers a collection of fresh compositions heavily laced with multi-tracked guitar harmonies,

## THE TRAGICALLY HIP

Third album is repetitious, fails to spark interest

Almost every rock and roll band crafts, in nearly all original compositions, some kind of catchy musical hook to snag the listeners.

The result of this creative musicality is a toe-tapping, head-bobbing, and basically get down and boogie reaction from the longhaired rock fan subculture of the civilized world.

Unfortunately, Canadian electric rock band The Tragically Hip fails to elicit any of the above reactions with their virtually hookless new

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album, "Fully Completely."

All this quintet's new release manages to spark in the listener is a

pathetic yawn and a stretch.

The opening track, "Courage (for Hugh MacLennan)," is the first indicator of the dark disease of tedium that shrouds the album. Gordon Downie's vibrating vocals blend with the "ho-hum" guitar work of Bobby Baker and Paul Langlois resulting in relative obscurity, while Gord Sinclair's bass playing and Johnny Fay's drum beats casually limp along. Not one element of

the song reaches out to capture the audience

Even the standard guitar solo, almost always the paramount of intensity, sounds listless and dull in this insipid track. To be blunt, this songthis album- is a terrible bore.

Yet, somehow the band does not com-

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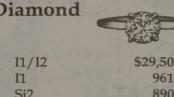
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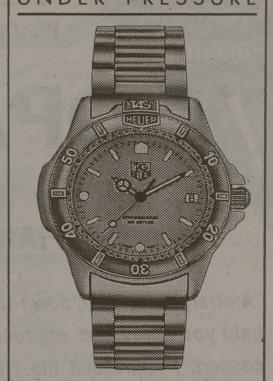
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
