He disagreed with burdening later generations with nuclear waste, especially when society could easily eliminate the energy source using new, innovative

Hydropower shows promise as

a new energy source, but prob-lems exist because flooding often results from the damming of waterways, he said.

'There has to be a better way," he said. "We have to find it or create it."

To create new power sources, people must apply creativity to currently existing technologies, he said. If individuals are willing to make the commitment, solar panels may provide the energy source of the future, he said. Childs said if public figures

were to show support for solar power, the public would soon fol-

low in their support.
"Did you know that Jimmy Carter put solar panels on the White House and Ronald Reagan took them down," he said. "If took them down," he said. President Clinton was to put the panels back on, that would be a

great symbolic gesture."
He said it will take broad ac-

tion from the government, corpo rations and other public interest groups to make any drastic change in the way the country uses energy. But people can make a difference on a local level, he


