### A&M enters season on tough schedule Football for Moms?

Last summer, former Texas A&M athletic director John David Crow and head football coach

R.C. Slocum decided the fourth-ranked Aggies needed to make every attempt to upgrade their schedule.


Southern Methodist- The Musters and lack 20 conjugations from lack

Texas- Stop me if this sounds familiar. The Longhorns have a great middle linebacker, Winfred Tubbs, but have a question mark at quarterback. Shea Morenz has gotten the nod, but he has looked shaky in spring and summer drills. Longhorn coach John Mackovic will find out just how good his team is in the first two games, meeting Colorado and Syracuse. They could be 0-2 early.

But for the Raiders to compete they have to find a way to stop A&M's running game, something they could not do last year as Greg Hill and

Rodney Thomas both rushed for over one hundred yards at Kyle Field in A&M's 19-17 win.

A&M meets Tech on October 2 in Lubbock, the SWC opener for the Aggies. Look for the Raiders to become another victim on A&M's roll towards a third consecutive Cotton Bowl and undefeated league record.


