

Recreational Sports to sponsor fair

The Department of Recreational Sports is hoping to put some kick into Aggie exercise routines this semester by sponsoring a sports fair from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday at Rudder Fountain.

"We want to highlight the programs that are available on campus," said Judy Reising, recreational sports assistant director.

"A lot of programs are free of charge and we want to increase the awareness of what's available for health and recreation."

A.P. Beutel Health Center, Aggie R.E.A.C.H. and the University Police Department will be available to discuss health precautions and property safety. Forty groups are registered for the fair, which promotes overall healthy lifestyles.

Some organizations participating include the Athletic Ticket Office, Campus Sports, Food Services and MSC Bowling & Games.

TAMU Outdoors and other intramural sports clubs will have exhibits and demonstrations of sports such as fencing and gymnastics.

Students can play volleyball on one of several volleyball courts that will be set up on Simpson Drill Field from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Also, a drawing will be held for a trip to the 1994 Spring National Beach Volleyball Championship.

The organization will be giving away hats, T-shirts and posters to students every hour.

Cpl. Betty LeMay, a crime specialist with UPD, said officers will be stamping identification on bicycles to help prevent thefts.

The UPD will also be available to answer any questions on safety and security.

James Welford, associate director of recreational sports, said he anticipates 6,000 to 7,000 students to attend the event.

"We want to make sure students are aware of what we have to offer," he said. "It's a grand start for a new school year."

year thinking that higher education would suffer a 5 to 10 percent reduction," she said. "We were pleased that they actually came forward with an increase in funding."

But the set amount of money the System has been given may decrease because of contingent is-

ssues, which could cause the System's institutions to lose additional funds according to riders in the appropriation's bill that determined this year's budget, Crain said.

"Because of these riders, we may not actually get our hands on the actual amount of money appropriated," she said.

One hundred million dollars has to be saved through the state this year, Crain said.

If A&M institutions can't come

up with cost saving plans, then they could lose a percentage of their funding.

Crain said Texas A&M University will not have more than a 2 to 3 percent reduction.

"Right now we have no indication what that number is," she said.

"The problem is compounded if we find out later in the fiscal year. That gives us less time to absorb the reduction."

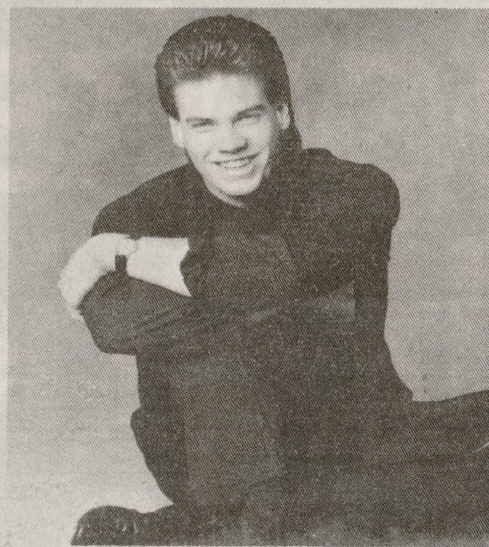
