Tenneco to provide utilities

The Texas A&M University System Board of Regents authorized an agreement Friday with Tenneco Power Generation Co. of Houston to provide the campus with steam, hot and chilled water and electricity.

The University considered offers from CSW Energy, Inc. and the city of College Station but decided Tenneco made the most economic sense

Joe Sugg, director of the Physical Plant, said this project will provide energy needs to the Uni-

versity and charge only for utility usage costs.

Sugg said the University will lease real estate to Tenneco and pay them for the University's utility needs. He said by transferring the risks to the developer, Tenneco's proposal made the most economic sense.

"The cost of utilities is the largest single line item cost to the University," he said.

Sugg said he hopes to finalize the agreement by the end of the month. If everything goes according to plan, the new plant will begin construction before Christmas and will be providing the University with water by September

1994. The plant will be fully operational by August 1995. The details of the project will be released when the plans have

been finalized.

A&M to improve Evans Library

The Texas A&M University System Board of Regents created a fund Friday that will improve Sterling C. Evans Library, which is currently ranked 49th in the nation among university libraries

System Regent John R. Lindsey said he was surprised at the low ranking, which is based on the quantity of materials rather than the quality, and said he wants to improve on it.

Marylou Goodyear, interim library director, said the ranking and the budget will improve as soon as

the West Campus wing is complete. Interim University President E. Dean Gage said the ranking, although still low, has increased from number 65 in 1989. The increase in ranking coincides with the increased budget that went from \$6.7 million in 1989 to the current \$8.3 million, he said.

Gage said he expects the budget to increase be-

cause of a \$1 per semester hour increase in the st dent computing access fee, which went into effet this semester, and the newly established fund a proved by the Board Friday.

The fund, valued at \$1 million, is a result of a ner contract between the University and Coca-Cola USA The contract was established to provide a partner ship between Coca-Cola and the University to set a a number of funds.

In addition to the \$1 million allotted to the librar \$1 million was given to minority scholarshi \$500,000 for scholarships for dependent childre support staff, \$500,000 for visual and performing \$500,000 for the athletic department, \$300,000 for Residence Hall Association, \$200,000 for Student G ernment and \$500,000 for international initiatives.

The Board gave the president of A&M auth to determine how the other funds will be used.

The money raised by the contract will be part A&M's Capturing the Spirit Campaign, a universi wide fund-raising campaign.

Aggie enrollment at all-time high

Interim University President E. Dean Gage announced Friday that Texas A&M University enrollment has reached an all-time high.

Including the Galveston cam-pus, A&M has 43,752 students, 6,397 of whom are freshmen.

Gage said he was most impressed with the increase in minority enrollment which now accounts for 14 percent of the total student body. However, he said, there was a significant decrease in international student enrollment. The number of minorities grad-

uating last year from A&M increased by more than 33 percent since the 1989-90 school year. Gage said the largest increase in

enrollment in A&M's colleges occurred in the College of Veterinary Medicine, and the largest decrease was in the College of Liberal Arts.

The trend seems to point to more high school graduates going into science-related areas of

increased enrollment, all Syste schools reported significant i creases in enrollment. The large an almost nine percent increas occurred at Texas A&M Interna tional University.

According to the annual sur mary of the Texas Education 0 portunity Plan for Higher Educ tion, A&M showed an overall crease in minority employment executive, administrative an managerial positions.
