The Texas A&M Lady Aggie soccer team recorded its seventh straight win Sunday with a 4-2 victory over the 10th-ranked Golden Knights of Central Flori-

The Aggies improved their record to 7-2 while UCF fell to 3-6. A&M head coach G. Guerrieri


