That night the powerful Lady Longhorns unceremoniously dumped the Lady Aggies in three straight games, proving that the Aggies still had a lot of room for improvement.

"That was our first conference game and we really weren't prepared for it, " A&M volleyball head coach Laurie Corbelli said. "It was early in the season, and maybe we were a little bit too nervous, and they took advantage of that."

And now, eighteen matches later and wiser, the Aggies are looking for revenge as they square off against the nation's second-ranked Lady Longhorns at 7 p.m. tonight at G. Rollie White Colise-

With a victory, the Aggies will move into a tie with the Longhorns for the Southwest Conference lead, with only Houston left to play for the remainder of the team's conference schedule. A&M can finish no worse than second in the conference, thus earning a bye in the first round of the SWC tournament




