logs into place. Workers bind the logs together with loops of wire, three at the bottom and three at the top of each log.

Logs for the upper stacks are raised on tag lines, run by yellowpots. Chains are attached to each end of the log. One chain goes up to a rope around a pulley on centerpole and down to a pickup truck, and one chain goes to a rope held by a ground crew. The truck backs up slowly to raise the log, and the ground crew guides the log to a swing worker, who wires it into place.

Paul Yhap, Class of '92 and the yellowpot for Off Campus Aggies, said the most important thing is for the ground crew to keep the rope running freely behind their backs.

"The rope has to slide across your butt freely," he said. "After second and third shift the yellowpot's butt gets worn off. It's important to have on several pairs of jeans when working tag line."

Residence halls and Corps units are assigned shifts during push, which began this year on Nov. 10. Sophomore Adam Houston, a Moses Hall crew chief, said typically a hall or outfit will work 6 p.m. to midnight one night, midnight to 6 a.m. the next and then have a night off.

During the last few days of stack, the largest logs are placed around the first stack using a crane. Each hall and outfit cuts down a dress log and carves their name in its side, and the largest log is the redpot log, cut down by the senior and junior redpots.

The fifth and sixth stacks are built last; fifth stack by the junior redpots and sixth stack by the senior redpots.

On the day of Bonfire, the orange outhouse representing a "t.u. frat house" is raised to the top of the stack with a crane. The perimeter poles are removed and all unused logs are cleared from the field. Logs are laid in a wide circle around stack to form the perimeter spectators must remain outside when Bonfire is lit at the traditional time of "dark-thirty."

Morrison is in the process of forming a non-profit organization to continue helping others throughout the year.

reaction is commonplace in every place we play," Hearnberger said. "We've had beer bottles thrown at us."

Hearnberger said it was evident the Rice students were giving the Aggie Band the "Siege Heil" symbol as soon as they started their performance.

"It's sad that that's what they think," Hearnberger said. "He said that they equate us with that."

"But it didn't really affect our performance," he said.

The actions of the Rice students have caused many people at Rice to voice their opinion in their student newspaper, the Thresher.

The Thresher published a letter condemning the actions of the Rice students from, Trey Duhon, A&M Class of '92.

"I can understand much of the rivalry between our schools," Duhon said. "But calling an American military band 'Nazis' goes beyond way too far."

Duhon said although some actions could be considered "picking fun" at a rival school, the actions of the Rice students lacked class.

In reaction to this letter, Chris Thomas, a Rice student, wrote a column in the Thresher which defended the actions of the Rice students at the football game.

"Our salute to the Aggie Band was one of mockery," Thomas said. "We sought to ridicule the Corps band for what it was, a bunch of wanna-be-soldiers brainwashed by the honor of submitting to a hierarchical system that offers little in the way of personal individuality."

Thomas said in his column that he wrote on the behalf of student body of Rice.

"Our use of irony to ridicule the Corps band does not imply that the Aggie cadets have massacred millions of Jews. We do not suggest that the Aggie Corps will invade Poland at any time in the near future. We are highly doubtful that Texas A&M will ever adopt the swastika as the school flag. If you do, please respect the rights of any race, Nazism out there and refrain from coloring it maroon. That would be a tacky gesture indeed," Thomas said.

Istre said this attitude is apparent on the Rice campus, and most students don't understand why anyone would be offended.

"I've spoken to a lot of students about it, and they just don't seem to get it," Istre said. "I know that some Rice students think the Aggie cadets need to lighten up. They think the cadets take things too seriously."

But Istre said he did not want the A&M community to think of Rice felt this way.

"I know thousands of Aggie went to war during World War II against the regime and the dictator for which the salute glorifies," Istre said. "I also know that a good number of them did not come back."
