GALVESTON - Restrictions on the use of alcohol on Galveston beaches are under attack by a group that includes store owners and beer distributors.

Organizers of an effort to repeal the ban call it illegal and bad for business.

A.R. Lucas, who owns three convenience stores on the island, said constraints cost him \$5,000 in beer sales and \$10,000 in other sales in June alone, when the restrictions went into effect. It is blatantly against the law," he said




