boys coach Jimmy Johnson said of the Bills' victory Sunday. "Everybody looks at last year's game, but we got nine turnovers then."

Last year, the Bills' best moment in an otherwise bleak game came when Don Beebe sprinted down field to prevent yet another Cowboys touchdown.

Dallas defensive end Leon Lett had scooped up a fumble and was showboating his way to the end zone, only to be overtaken by Beebe.

It was small consolation for Buffalo, beaten again in the biggest game of the year.

The Bills lost to the New York Giants in 1991 and to the Washington Redskins in 1992.

Still, the Bills point with pride to their four straight trips to the Super Bowl, something no other team has managed.

"Nobody expected us to be here," wide receiver Andre Reed said. "They expected somebody else in the AFC to knock us off."

"You know, we're always up for the challenge. I think that's what sets this team apart from anybody else."

The Cowboys feel good about themselves.

"I think going to the Super Bowl, everybody should be confident," defensive end Charles Haley said. "Confidence — that's the key."

But there will be a certain amount of caution. The Cowboys don't want to appear overconfident.

"I think it's going to be hard," offensive lineman Erik

Williams said. "Buffalo always manages to get there because of their talent. They're just that much better than the other guys in the AFC."

"What is this, their fourth? fifth? Alright, fourth. But they lost the last couple so they're going to be riled up. We're going to have to take it to another level."

Wide receiver Alvin Harper figures they're already there.

The Cowboys are the team of the '90s," he said. "The Big D stands for dynasty."

"No, it's not automatic. We just have to go down there, make plays and do the things we're capable of doing."

On the other hand, the Bills want to avoid one more distinction that would truly set them apart.

No team in professional sports has ever lost four consecutive championships.

Coach Marv Levy said it doesn't matter how the Bills prepare for another shot at the NFL title.

"When we show up at the stadium, we have to do something different," he said. Like win.

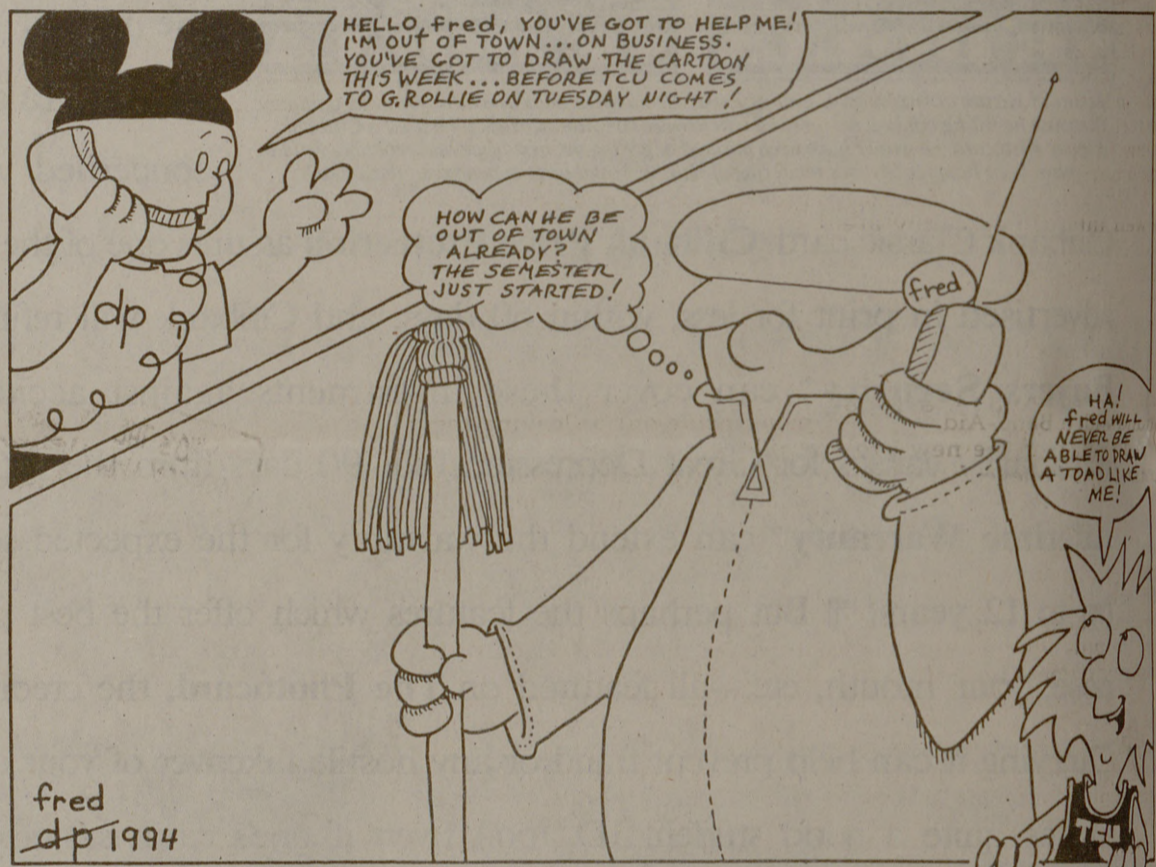

"We've been working extremely hard. Better than the past few years. It reflects a lot better at the end of the season. I'm expecting a lot from our team this year."

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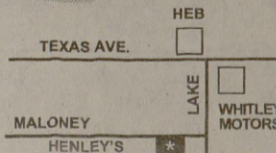
