

The Texas A&M women's basketball team got off to a bit of a slow start Sunday, before running away from an overwhelmed Cal State Sacramento squad.

Led by sophomore guard Donyale Canada's career-high 18 points, the Lady Aggies defeated the Cal State Sacramento Hornets 87-63 at G. Rollie White Coliseum.

The Aggies moved to 11-3 on the year and, by virtue of Texas' upset of Texas Tech on Saturday af-ternoon, lead the Southwest Conference race with a 3-0 record.

"We took the timeouts because we didn't want the game to get away from us in the first half," Deane said. "I also told the guys that Texas A&M is capable of scorng droughts.


We took Damon Johnson and ut (junior forward Brian) Bidlingmyer on him after the second timeout. After the third timeout, I just told the guys to stay in the game.


The switch worked for the Saints (13-3) as Johnson only scored four points in the rest of the first half and went scoreless in the second
