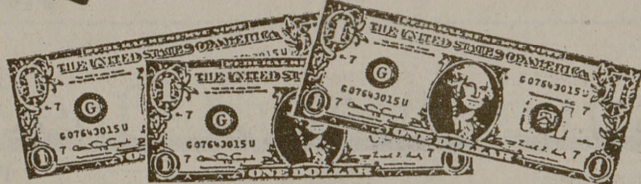

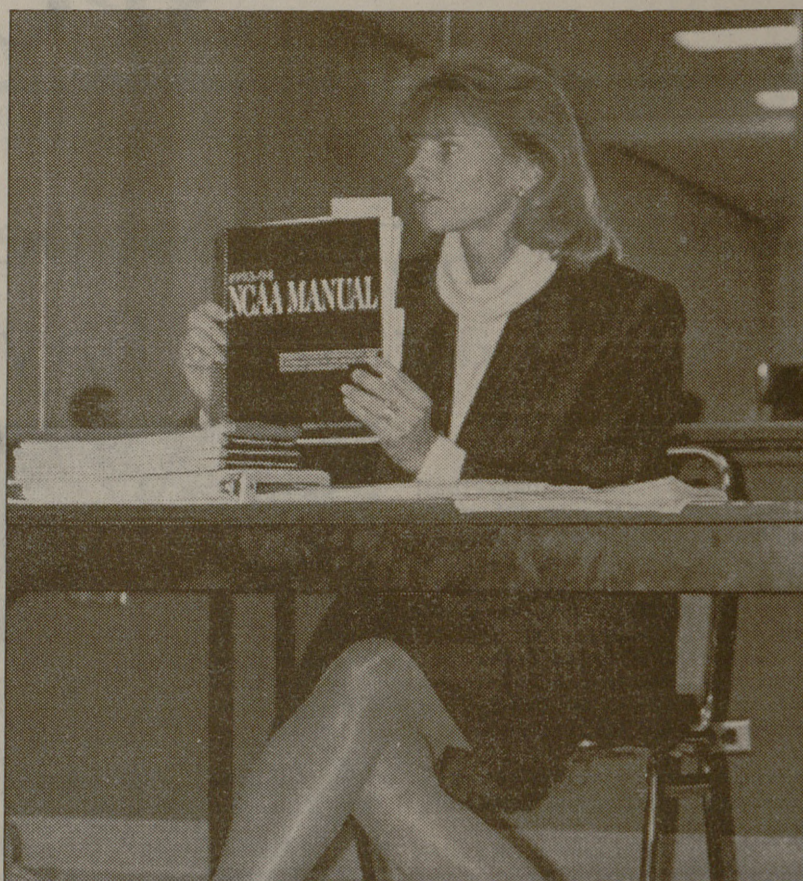
"If a booster is doing something it is our responsibility to educate him, to monitor his activities, even though there are so many that is difficult to do, it is still our responsibility," she said. "There's not really a way to ensure the integrity within a person, but what we can try to do is to let our student-athletes and our boosters and our coaches and our staff know that when they take the risk of becoming involved with a violation that there will be consequences."

The work of the Compliance Office is made easier by the diligence of A&M's coaching staff, Zalesky-Ellison said.

"Our coaching staff is very competent and good at complying with NCAA rules," she said. "We're very fortunate here to have such a dedicated coaching staff."

Zalesky-Ellison did praise head football coach R.C. Slocum in particular, because of his work during A&M's most recent NCAA investigation.

"I think one thing that came through this last NCAA investigation was that it was very evident of the kind of integrity coach Slocum has," she said.

Expansion Jaguars want to talk to Cowboys' Johnson

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — The Jacksonville Jaguars want to talk with Dallas Cowboy coach Jimmy Johnson, if he wants to talk with them, The Florida Times-Union reported today.

Johnson, whose Cowboys won their second consecutive Super Bowl on Sunday, said Monday that he has no plans to change jobs, but some saw his remarks as leaving the door open.

"I don't have any thoughts right now that I'll be anywhere else, but I'm not 100 percent committed to anything," Johnson said.

The Jaguars, the newest member of the NFL, will use contacts to approach Johnson this week.

Sources have told the newspaper if Johnson sends back a message that he is interested, the team would then seek permission from Cowboys owner Jerry Jones to speak with Johnson.

The Jaguars also will try to speak with former Washington Redskins coach Joe Gibbs, sources told the newspaper.

The Jaguars have a policy not publicly discussing any coaching or general manager possibilities.

Jones has said repeatedly he will deny the Jaguars permission to speak with Johnson, who has five years remaining on his contract.

Commissioner Paul Tagliabue said the league's policy on such matters is hazy.

"I'd have to look again at the rules on that," he told the newspaper.

Johnson hinted last week he having total control of an expansion team would be an intriguing possibility.

Gibbs, who resigned as Redskins coach after the 1992 season, remains under contract to the team, and Redskins owner Jack Kent Cooke has denied permission to both the Atlanta Falcons and Carolina Panthers to speak with Gibbs.

Gibbs has expressed interest in the Jaguars job but has said he wants to sit out the coming season to watch his son play football at Stanford, and then return to coaching in 1995.

The Jaguars begin play in September 1995.
