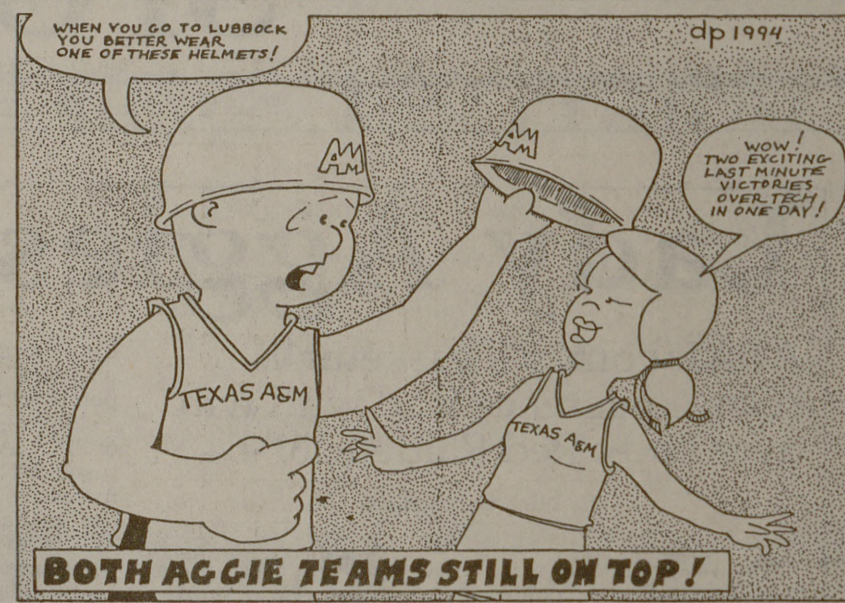

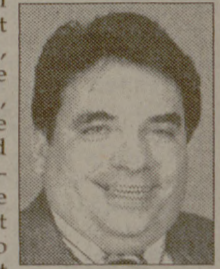

A&M track and field teams perform well at Cosby meet

RENO - The Texas A&M men's and women's indoor track and field teams ran well at the Bill Cosby Invitational on Saturday at the University of Nevada. A&M coach Ted Nelson said the meet allowed the Aggies to evaluate their teams' standings. "The performances are improving," Nelson said. "But we still have a long way to go before we're at the level we have to be for the conference meet (Feb. 18 and 19 in Fort Worth).

"The competition was strong, but I thought we competed well." • Sophomore Anjanette Kirkland ran a season-best 7.87 in the 55-meter hurdles preliminaries, and finished second with a time of 7.93 in the event's final. Dana Cunningham also ran a season-best 8.46 during the final. "Anjanette just keeps improving," Nelson said. Kirkland has provisionally qualified for the the NCAA indoor meet, and has steadily reduced her times in the 55-meter hurdles. • Keish Leatherman finished

third in the women's high jumping a 5-foot, 6-inches. • Terrif Fojtik placed fifth in a jump of 5-foot, 4-inches. "Our high jumpers are forming well for being freshmen," Nelson said. On the men's side, sophomore Danny McCray and Dante Bostood out, turning in season-best times of 6.37 in the 55-meter to finish second and third. "Danny and Dante showed a lot of promise with their first meet," Nelson said. "Those were the two times from the Southwestern Conference at the meet."

Houston Rockets refuse Elliott trade

HOUSTON (AP) - The Houston Rockets on Sunday called off their trade for Detroit Pistons forward Sean Elliott after he failed to pass a physical. Rockets coach Rudy Tomjanovich refused to say what part of the physical Elliott had failed. Elliott was traded Friday for forwards Robert Horry and Matt Bullard. He took a physical Saturday in Houston, then Rockets team physician Bruce Moseley requested additional tests. According to NBA rules, all

parties involved in a trade must pass physicals before the trade is completed. "It ain't going to happen, so let's go on from here," Tomjanovich said. Horry and Bullard were with the Pistons on Saturday night when they lost at home to the Nets 107-100, but neither player was allowed in uniform. Tomjanovich said Horry and Bullard were to return to Houston Sunday but would miss Sunday night's home game against the Minnesota Timberwolves. They will rejoin the team at practice Monday.

"I don't feel anything negative about these guys," Tomjanovich said of the two. Elliott, who had knee surgery in high school, plays with braces on both knees. Last season, playing for the San Antonio Spurs, he missed 12 games because of knee problems. He missed his last two games with the Pistons because of pneumonia. "Anybody would be concerned if you can't go through routine physical in a direct, straightforward way," Moseley said Saturday.
