Marine's tattoos get him booted out of boot camp

DAYTON, Ohio — When Marine Corps recruit Dylan Fogle showed up with a gargoyle and a thunderbird tattooed on his head, he got the boot from boot camp.

Fogle, 20, said the tattoos were visible through his hair when he signed up for a four-year hitch in November, and that his recruiter told him they wouldn't keep him out of the Marines.

Fogle, a Dayton resident, reported for basic training on Jan. 20 at Parris Island, S.C. For the next three weeks, he said, he performed in the top 10 percent of his platoon.

On Feb. 15, his commanding officer sent for him.

"He looked at my tattoos and said they were going to have to send me home," Fogle said Monday. "He said they didn't really fit the image of the Marine Corps because the Marines are always supposed to be looking perfect."

Maj. Scott Campbell, spokesman for the base, said recruits can be discharged if they have a tattoo officials deem as offensive, obscene, or conveying a negative message about the military.

The recruiter may have approved Fogle because his hair was longer at the time, Campbell said.

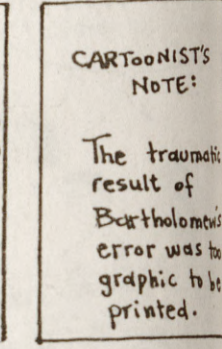
The gargoyle is on the back of Fogle's head; the mythical thunderbird over his left ear.

"Gargoyles, in architecture, were supposed to guard against evil, symbolically," Fogle said.

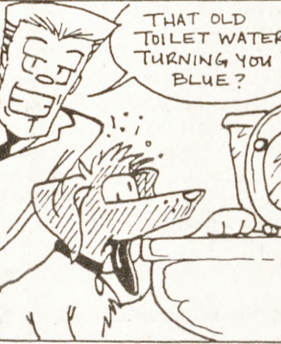

Having the name of the faculty member's department printed in the advertisement is meant to make contact between faculty and students easier, Gage said. "Gage has never been contacted by a student for Christian advising, he said."

"I have been asked about my name and title being featured in the ad once," Gage said. "I understand

there may be a conflict between church and state. The group should look into that."

Gage suggested phone numbers should be listed in place of departments.

James Morgan, speaker of the Faculty Senate, said the departments and titles should be removed from the advertisement.

"It is perfectly reasonable for a person to be listed in the ad as an individual," Morgan said. "However, it is inappropriate for titles to be on the list. I understand the need for concern, but we must also

be sensitive to people losing personal rights when they hold an office. There must be a distinction between the two."

Gage was invited to address the issue at the Hillel Jewish Student Foundation in February, where he said students should be tolerant of other's differences, faults and religions and treat them with respect.

Rabbi Peter Tarlow, of the Hillel Jewish Student Association, said that, although Gage did not directly address the issue, he opened up a dialogue.

"He tried to let non-Christians on campus know he is not only the president of Christian students but of all students," Tarlow said.

Tarlow said using titles and departments funded by state dollars in the advertisement is illegal, and the advertisement puts non-Christian students in a difficult position, he said.

"How do you explain missing class because of a Jewish holiday to a professor who speaks about Christianity to students?" Tarlow said. "No one is against Christianity. We are against bias."

their own security.

The refugee officers, each teamed with a Palestinian trans-

lator, normally provide humanitarian relief and services to the Palestinian refugee camps.

Since they've been serving as observers, they said some Israeli commanders appreciate their efforts to calm both sides in demonstrations.

The settlers have been particularly hostile, smashing the windows on U.N. cars and threatening them, officers said.

"The settler violence is much, much more difficult to handle. We can't handle it basically because the settlers don't listen to

anyone," said Andersson.

Since the Palestinian uprising against Israel's occupation started in December 1987, more than 1,270 Palestinians have died in clashes with Israelis.

In the same period over 800 Israelis have died.
