Comptroller discusses state issues

John Sharp, Texas comptroller of public accounts, told Texas A&M students his office focused on reinventing government at the MSC Political Forum Wednesday night. Sharp proposed 961 recommendations that will decrease the cost of government programs while providing the same quality service.

Sharp said that, over the past three years, he learned

a lot about the government. 'In one respect there is no difference between business and government organizations. Their goal is to survive," Sharp said. "Businesses survive by making the customer happy, but when the government and businesses are in a pinch for money, they react diametrically opposed to each other.

They will close the Washington Monument if you threaten the park service funds," Sharp said. "They never think about downsizing things you can't feel."

Through the three years of reviewing government policy, Sharp said he realized the political parties are very similar.
