

## A&M track comes up short again

The Texas A&M men's track and field team received many top-notch performances but for the second straight year finished second behind the University of Texas at the men's Southwest Conference Championships this weekend in Houston.

Scott Garvin led the way collecting 18 points for the Aggies.

He won the men's 1,500-meters with a time of 3:48.63. He would come back two hours later to take second place in the men's 5,000-meters and take his spot as the elite long distance runner in the conference.

"We felt Scott would be the man to beat in the 1,500," Assistant Coach Ed Marcinkiewicz. "He (Garvin) came here with a mission to prove he was the best in the conference, mission accomplished."

The Aggies also scored big in the men's decathlon, a competition that is becoming a tradition at Texas A&M.

Sophomore Richard Harrison and freshman Ryan Theriault placed first and third, respectively, with strong performances in the ten-event competition.

Harrison won the decathlon with a score of 7177, easily taking the title and giving him his second provisional mark of the outdoor season.

"Last year, Harrison came here as a favorite and lost that made him hungrier," said Assistant Coach Juan De La Garza. "We keep bringing up the young one and they will take over."

## Three in the 1st

### Adams, Glenn, Hill taken in NFL's draft

DALLAS — The only Texans taken in the first round of Sunday's National Football League draft were from perennial Southwest Conference champion Texas A&M.

The Aggies set a school record with the three first rounders — the same number of SWC players drafted in the second round.

All-American defensive end

Sam Adams was the first drafted, going to the Seattle Seahawks with the eighth pick.

Adams will team up with All-Pro defensive tackle Cortez Kennedy in Seattle, and the duo will anchor a Seahawks line that could be scary.

"They (the Seahawks) have two people now who are going to be dealt with," said A&M defensive line coach Bill Johnson, who coached Adams for three years.

Adams, a 6-2, 292-pound junior, had 10 1/2 sacks, 13 tackles for loss and 16 quarterback pressures last season.

Some draft analysts expressed

concern about the third lineman taken in the draft. His practice habits had been questioned, and he has been criticized for sometimes inconsistent play.

"I think he's going to grow up," Johnson said. "He's never had a chance to grow up, since he started playing as soon as he got here as a freshman. Any time he's had problems he's overcome them."

All-American defensive back Aaron Glenn was the next Texan to go, taken by the New York Jets with the 12th pick.

The Jets traded up to take Glenn, a senior, sending New Orleans their 13th choice in the first round and a fifth-round choice.

Glenn, 5-8 and 184 pounds, was the second defensive back taken, behind Alabama's Antonio Langham at No. 9. Glenn was the nation's leading punt returner with a 19.9-yard average and had two touchdowns.

Glenn, the SWC defensive player of the year and a solid man-to-man defender, was forecast to go before Langham.

"Different teams want different people. I'm just happy I'm a Jet," Glenn told KTCK-AM in Dallas. "I'm just glad I'm the guy they wanted. You never go out there and say, 'I should have been the first one taken.'"

Aggies running back Greg Hill was a late first-round pick, going to Kansas City with the 25th pick.

Hill may help the Chiefs' running back situation that looked somewhat shaky. Earlier this year, they cut Harvey Williams, and last year Marcus Allen, 34, was the primary runner.

Hill, a 5-10, 206-pound junior, was the first back in Southwest Conference history to rush for 1,000 yards in his freshman and sophomore years.
